1. JOHN¹ BAYLEY was born Abt. 1580 in England, and died 1652 in Massachusetts.

Notes for JOHN BAYLEY: He came to America in 1635 with his son John. He located first at Newberry, MA and was a weaver by trade. In 1637, he located in the wilderness [later Colchester] with William Scholar. In 1651, he was ordered to return to England or send for his wife. He died the next year. His will was proved 13 Apr 1652 (source: Cutter, W.R. 1915, p. 384).

2. JOHN² BAYLEY, JR. (*JOHN*¹) was born 1613 in Chippenham, Wiltshire, England, and died November 06, 1690 in Rowley, Massachusetts¹. He married ELEANOR Abt. 1640. She was born 1624, and died 1700.

Notes for JOHN BAYLEY, JR.: The data below was posted to "Our Family Genealogy Pages" under John Bailey (<http://www.ourgenerationsancestors.org/index.php>).

Notes: CHR: C. W. Shickle, comp, "A Copy of the Register of the Parish of Bromham, Wiltshire" (typescript, 1908), unpaginated (FHL #1526698 item 16).

NOTE: John is identified in the will of his father, John Bailey of Newbury, 28 Oct 1651, proved 13 Apr 1652, inv 12 Nov 1651 (THE PROBATE RECORDS OF ESSEX COUNTY, 3 vols. [Salem, MA, 1916-20], 1:145-46 [FHL #974.45 P2p]). John's birth year is calculated from age 65 on oath of allegiance taken at Newbury in 1678 (RECORDS AND FILES OF THE QUARTERLY COURTS OF ESSEX COUNTY, 9 vols. [Salem, MA, 1911-75], 7:156 [FHL #974.45 P2e]). The origin of the Baileys was said to be Chippenham, Wilts (Joshua Coffin, A SKETCH OF THE HISTORY OF NEWBURY [Boston: 1845], 18, 294 [FHL #6050089]). Chippenham par regs do not include the baptism of John or his brother Robert. However, John's baptism is found in the nearby parish of Bromham, 19 Dec 1613, the son of John Bayly the Younger and wife Anne. In support of this theory is an only brother Robert, also named in the will of John Bailey, Sr, of Newbury, above.

MAR: No mar rec found. Four documents suggest John Bailey's wife Eleanor is the dau of John Emery. The will of John Emery, which does not identify all his children by name, makes Joseph Bailey overseer in the event that his son John Emery or son-in-law Abram Merrill die before the provisions of the will are carried out. Joseph Bailey is the son of John and Eleanor Bailey. The will of John Bailey, Sr, of Newbury, 28 Oct 1651, proved 13 Apr 1652, calls John Emery, Sr, "brother" (THE PROBATE RECORDS OF ESSEX COUNTY, 3 vols. [Salem, MA, 1916-20],

1:145-46 [FHL #974.45 P2p). John Bailey, Sr, is the father of John Bailey, whose wife was Eleanor. The term brother was sometimes applied to men whose children married. The estate of Isaac Brown of Newbury was administered by his widow, Rebecca, who is the dau of John and Eleanor Bailey. In an agreement concerning the disposal of the estate, 29 Sep 1674, Rebecca desired that her "brother" [brother-in-law] Francis Brown and uncle John Emery be overseers of the agreement (PROBATE RECORDS, 2:398). The suggestion is that John Emery is a brother of Rebecca's mother, Eleanor. Finally, Samuel Sewall wrote in his diary on 21 May 1704: "The aged [James] Ordway comes to see me, complains bitterly of his cousin John Emery's carriage to his wife, which makes her leave him and go to her sister Bayly" ("Diary of Samuel Sewall, 1674-1729," COLLECTIONS OF THE MASSACHUSETTS HISTORICAL SOCIETY, 5th series, 6[1879]:102 [FHL #1011923). Hence, James Ordway's wife, Anne Emery, had a sister who married a Bailey.

DEATH: No death rec found. See the will of John Bailey of Newbury, 30 Dec 1690, proved 31 Mar 1691, inv 5 Mar 1690/1, Essex Co. Probate, (o.s.) 304:318-19 (FHL #960486).

John and his father, John, came to America from England in 1635. Came from Chippenham, about 70 miles due west of London. John was a weaver by trade (Commemorative Biographical Record of Prominent and Representative Men of Racine and Kenosha Counties Wisconsin, Chicago: J.H. Beers, 1906. p. 181).

3. REV. JAMES³ BAYLEY (*JOHN*², *JOHN*¹) was born September 12, 1650 in Newbury, Essex, MA, and died January 17, 1706/07 in Roxbury, Suffolk, MA, age 56². He married (1) MARY CARR September 17, 1672 in Newbury, Essex, Massachusetts³, daughter of GEORGE CARR and ELIZABETH. She was born Abt. 1650 in prob. MA, and died October 28, 1688 in Killingworth, Middlesex, CT⁴. He met (2) MARY Abt. 1690. She was born Abt. 1646, and died October 23, 1717 in Roxbury, Suffolk, MA, age 71.

Notes for REV. JAMES BAYLEY: "That first minister in Salem Village was the Rev. James Bayley who arrived in October 1672. An inexperienced pastor, Bayley was no match for the powerful forces already in place in Salem who opposed his ministry. When he came under attack from the opposition (for no less than omitting family prayers in his own household), anti-Bayley forces withheld their taxes until the poor man was nearly destitute. Eventually, Bayley left Salem, fed up with the village, the town and the ministry in general. He eventually became a doctor in Roxbury, Massachusetts" (source: http://www.trutv.com/library/crime/notorious_murders/not_guilty/salem_witches/1.html).

"The first preacher in Salem Village was James Bayley, a Newbury native whose enthusiasm could not mend the rift that had formed between the two disputing factions that had developed among the community. Most of the church members were in favor of the appointment of Bayley as minister, but those who opposed him showed their disapproval by not paying their tithes. Despite the unstable position in which Bayley was ministering to the people, he remained loyal to them for eight years. When his wife died, Bayley chose to leave the village, and accepted a call to a church in Killingworth, Connecticut" (source: <http://www.loyno.edu/~history/journal/1998-9/Karson.htm>).

"Rev. James Bayley who came to Salem Town to minister found himself in a town full of discontent. In the book "Salem Possessed" it tells about how he was favored and given land to build upon and more discontent arose saying, "...James Bayley himself. Specifically, Bayley was accused of neglecting his church duties and omitting family prayers in his own household." Charges never held and his friends denied any wrong doing on Bayley's part. The central issue became who was the authority to call or dismiss a minister in Salem Village? In other words it became political. It came down to Salem Village was not a town so those in the village did not have the power to "call" a certain minister. Nothing is known about what gossip or hasty word or real or imagined slight may have caused some villagers initially to turn against Bayley, but the issue mushroomed to such proportions that the colonial legislature itself became involved." None of the three village institutions were useful instruments for the resolution of differences. This all happened thirteen years before the trials, but this book points out that most issues were

partisan along the years and dominated by one faction or another and when the seeming resolution came. The deciding faction lacked the ability to enforce its will on the whole community. It was judged that there was a "Collective defect in the social temperament of its inhabitants (an analysis implicit in most later accounts of the witchcraft outbreak)." "Structural defects in its organization rendered the Village almost helpless in coping with whatever disputes might arise. Rev. James Bayley finally resolved the issue by giving up the fight in 1680 and left the village. The dissention continued in Salem Village. It is not stated in the book that Rev. James Bayley was married to Mary Carr sister of Ann Carr, mother of Ann Putman who was the young girl at the bottom of the witch stories." A Bewitching of Christmas Past by Fennell, D.K.

"The Putnams were not in the business of charity, of course. And like most others who believe their fortune is owing to their closeness to God, they determined to let others have as little as possible. The largest expense of the parish, of course, was the pastor. And while having their own pastor was ostensibly the reason the people of Salem Farms wanted independence from Salem, the Putnams were not keen on paying for one. And so the Putnams were always waging some sort of guerrilla campaign or another against each minister seriatim. The first was James Bayley, who came to Salem Village its very first year. Harvard '69, Bayley had preached in Newbury. And while he was supported by the majority in the village, he aroused the opposition of the powerful; namely, the Putnams. There ensued, as in all Putnam-instigated crises, great divisions in the village. Bayley never settled in. He was given one yearly contract after another. Eventually strife reached such a point that the opposing parties petitioned the mother church in Salem for resolution. (Part of the condition the General Court imposed on setting up Salem Farms separate from the Town was that the mother church generally supervised matters ecclesiastical.) Nathaniel Putnam was in the opposition, and the mother church, which found no fault with Bayley, decided nevertheless not to resolve the dispute, even despite the fact that the opponents were in the minority. So the matter went to the General Court, which ruled firmly in favor of Bayley and even named a committee to make the rates. The Putnams again refused to pay. So Bayley decided to retreat from the field and give up his pretensions to the pulpit" (1 Upham 245-250.) (source: <http://hiddencause.wordpress.com/2011/01/06/a-bewitching-of-christmas-past-iii/>).

"1673 - 1679

James Bayley serves as minister of the Salem Village church. Controversy over whether to ordain Bayley, over failure to pay, and even for slander, made their way into lawsuits. Because Salem Village was not yet fully a town or church, Salem Towne had a say on the future of the minister" (<http://www.legendsofamerica.com/ma-witchtimeline.html>).

NOTE: A biography of James Bailey is found in John Langdon Sibley, BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES OF GRADUATES OF HARVARD UNIVERSITY, 3 vols. (Cambridge, MA, 1873-85), 2:291-99 (FHL #974.44/C1 J2s). James was a minister at Salem Village (Danvers), Killingworth, and Roxbury.

James graduated from Harvard in the Class of 1669. In Oct 1671 he transferred from the Church at Newbury to the First Church of Salem. He left Salem in 1682 and moved to Killingworth, CT. In about 1694, he moved with his 2nd wife to Roxbury (Cutter, 1915).

He married ELIZABETH RUGGLES June 03, 1697 in Rowley, Essex, Massachusetts⁷, daughter of CAPT. SAMUEL RUGGLES. She was born May 01, 1677 in Roxbury, Suffolk, MA⁸, and died 1733.

Notes for LIEUT. JAMES BAYLEY: He was a saddler by trade and lived in Roxbury, MA (Cutter, 1915).

5. SAMUEL⁵ BAYLEY (*LIEUT. JAMES⁴, REV. JAMES³, JOHN², JOHN¹*) was born February 01, 1704/05 in Roxbury, Mass⁹, and died January 02, 1799 in Ward, MA¹⁰. He married ANNA RICHARDSON December 17, 1730 in Boston, Suffolk, Massachusetts^{11,12}, daughter of THOMAS RICHARDSON and ABIGAIL RUGGLES. She was born May 11, 1710, and died 1799 in Ward, MA.

Notes for SAMUEL BAYLEY: Samuel and Anna Bayley joined the church at Roxbury on August 15, 1731 (source: A Report of the Record Commissioners Containing the Roxbury land and church records. 1881, 2nd ed., (Boston: Rockwell & Churchill, 1884), p. 106). There were no Bayley land records in the book listed above.

Samuel and his family resided in Roxbury on the family homestead. Samuel and Anna Bayley were admitted to church membership in Roxbury on 15 Aug 1731 (source: Boston (Mass.) Registry Dept, *A Report of the Record Commissioners Containing the Roxbury Land and Church Records*, 2nd ed. Boston: Rockwell & Churchill, 1884. p. 106).

They later moved to Ward [now Auburn], Massachusetts.

6. JOSHUA⁶ BAYLEY/BAILEY (*SAMUEL⁵ BAYLEY, LIEUT. JAMES⁴, REV. JAMES³, JOHN², JOHN¹*) was born March 17, 1734/35 in Dudley, Worcester, MA^{14,15}, and died 1812 in Windsor, Windsor Co, VT. He married (1) MERCY DAVIS Abt. 1762 in Massachusetts. She was born Abt. 1742, and died Abt. 1788. He married (2) RACHEL STOW January 19, 1789 in Marlborough, Middlesex, MA¹⁶. He married (3) SYLVIA WARREN ANNIS February 24, 1805 in Hartland, Vermont by Samuel Cheever, Minister of the Gospel¹⁷. She was born Abt. 1740.

Notes for JOSHUA BAYLEY/BAILEY: The surname appears to be spelled Bayley at first, but it was gradually changed by descendants to Bailey. I will use the latter spelling throughout this tree. Joshua Bailey, Sr. and his son moved to Vermont in 1781. Joshua had 17 children.

Notes for JOSHUA BAILEY, JR.: Joshua fought in the Revolutionary War and received a pension for his service. He served June 13 to Dec. 1780 as a Private under Capt. Watson in the Massachusetts regiment of Gen. Poors Brigade. He was on a payroll document for the Town of Marlborough, MA. He served again from July to August 1781 under Capt. Green and Capt John Benjamin at Bethel Fort for Vermont. He appeared at a court hearing in Derby, VT at age 69 on 16 Aug 1832 to testify about his service. The document from the Department of the Interior gives his birth date as 9 Jan 1763. It shows that he moved to Windsor, Vermont with his father in 1781. Joshua's residence when he applied for the pension was Derby, VT.

The latter kept a pioneer tavern on the St. Lawrence, and a two-story house erected for this purpose is still standing (source: Gates, Curtis, Ed. *History of Massena, NY: From Our Country and It's People - A Memorial Record of St. Lawrence County*. New York: The Boston History Co. 1894).

JAMES*³, *JOHN*², *JOHN*¹) was born December 29, 1774 in Marlboro, MA²⁶, and died August 02, 1847 in Derby, Orleans, VT. She married JOB CORY Abt. 1794 in New Hampshire, son of TIMOTHY CORY and JEANNE BOYD. He was born June 02, 1768 in Plainfield, Cheshire, New Hampshire²⁷, and died Bef. September 1824 in Derby, Orleans, VT.

Notes for JOB CORY: He lived in Plainfield, Sullivan Co, NH in 1800. He lived in Derby, Orleans Co, VT in 1810, as were Lyman, Timothy, and Charles.

1800 census, New Grantham, Cheshire, New Hampshire: Job Cory (26-44) with 3 boys (under 10) and a woman (16-25). Total of 5 in the household.

1810 census, Derby, Orleans, Vermont: 13 in the household.

1820 census - not found in Derby, VT. Only two Corey - Timothy and Charles.

1850 census, Hartland, Windsor, Vermont: Parmina (39) and Elizabeth (39) Cory with children Kimball (10), Emma (8), and Allis (2). Also Mary Fay (18), Frederick Fay (10), John Hatch (30). Parmina was a farmer with property valued at \$3000.

1860 census, Brookfield, Orange, Vermont: Betsey Corey (44) with children Kimball (20), Emma (18), Alice (13), Sidney (9), Alma (7), and Carlton (5). Parmenas not found in 1860.

1870 census, Hanover, Grafton, New Hampshire: Parmenas (58) and Elizabeth (58) Corey with children Sydney (19), Alma B. (17), Carlton (15). Also Mercy Corey (68), Adeline Main (62) and Nancy Washburn (67).

1880 census, Hanover, Grafton, New Hampshire: Parmenas Corey (67) with children Alma B. (27) and Carlton L. (25). Also a boarder, John H. Vose (69). Parmenas was widowed and was listed as female.

8. MARY "POLLY" P.⁷ BAILEY (*JOSHUA⁶ BAYLEY/BAILEY, SAMUEL⁵ BAYLEY, LIEUT. JAMES⁴, REV. JAMES³, JOHN², JOHN¹*) was born January 18, 1785 in Windsor, VT³⁰, and died June 29, 1858 in Milton (Greater Boston area), Norfolk, Massachusetts, age 74³¹. She married CHARLES CORY Abt. 1803 in Derby Line, VT, son of TIMOTHY CORY and JEANNE BOYD. He was born Abt. 1775 in Prob. NH, and died September 05, 1843 in Ohio, buried in South Cemetery (also known as Kenilworth), Greene, Trumbull Co, OH³².

Notes for MARY "POLLY" P. BAILEY: In 1850, Mary P. Corey lived in Greene, Trumbull Co, OH with her son Orin and his family - meaning that she could not have died in 1843, as shown on the Cory Family Website. Her age was shown as 66. It's possible that the person reporting to the census taker did not know her true age, since she was shown as age 45+ in 1820, making her born before 1776.

Notes for CHARLES CORY: The book by Al Bertus Cory (1991) shows Charles as the son of Timothy Cory, b. 1756, a descendant of John Cory. However, there are no sources given so Charles' ancestry is not proven. A review of the baptisms in Weston, MA shows that all of Capt. Timothy Cory's children were listed but Charles was not. Thus, I believe that my ancestor, Charles Cory, is a descendant of John Cory of Suffolk Co, NY. I have placed him as a son of Timothy Cory, b. 1740, but this may not be correct. In New Hampshire baptisms listed on ancestry.com, most of Timothy's children are shown, but not Charles.

Orleans Co, VT was organized in 1792 so Charles Cory must have been an early settler there. He moved there before 1804, probably just after the Revolutionary War when many people moved to Vermont to escape the taxes levied by the new United States government. Perhaps his parents also moved there but they are not listed as early settlers in Orleans Co. I did find a Timothy Corey in Brighton, Essex Co, VT (adjacent to Orleans Co) in the early 1800s along with Elijah Bailey. Derby Line is only 8 miles from the Canadian border and 30 miles from Greensboro, VT. Derby was chartered in Oct 1779, and by 1800 the population was 178. Derby Line was a post village on the line between Derby and Canada, and the first permanent settlement was in 1795.

It appears that Charles and Mary moved to Ohio with at least four of their sons and probably some of the Pattersons in the mid 1830s. More research needs to be done on this family but we know that at least four sons ended up in Greene, Trumbull Co, OH.

1810 census, Derby, Orleans, Vermont: Chas. Corey: 3 boys (under 10 - Orin, Ira, Cyrus), 1 male (age 26-40 - Charles); 1 girl (under 10 - Eunice), 1 female (16-25), 1 female (26-44 - Polly). Total of 7 in the household.

1820 census, Derby, Orleans Co, VT: Charles Corey listed among others alphabetically. He is shown age 45 or older with 3 males 18 or younger and 3 females under 16. These ages match his sons Sylvester, Ira, Cyrus, Charles & Orin. His presumed wife on this record is shown 45 or older, which does not match with a birthdate of 1784 for Mary, his wife.

1830 census, not found

1840 census - not yet found

Regarding the cemetery in Trumbull Co, OH, Kee Rodgers wrote, "Remember, there is no such cemetery as Kenilworth. That name came from a woman who called the South Cemetery (didn't know the name of it) the "Old Cemetery at Kenilworth." Firstly there is no Kenilworth, it was the Kenilworth Post Office just north of the

cemetery. All the gene people because of the modern computer copied the incorrect name of Kenilworth Cemetery from a woman years later who did not read the "Old Cemetery at Kenilworth" correctly and thought it was the Kenilworth Cemetery. So she types up the cemetery list and makes the heading "Kenilworth Cemetery." No such animal. It's the "South Cemetery" or "Old South Cemetery" (14 April 2011).

Children of MARY BAILEY and CHARLES CORY are:

- i. ORIN⁸ CORY, b. October 10, 1804, Derby Line, Orleans Co, VT; d. December 25, 1901, Greene Twp, Trumbull Co, OH at age 92, buried in Greenlawn Cemetery, Greene Twp, Trumbull Co, OH³³; m. (1) MARY "POLLY" PHILLIPS, March 18, 1837, Waterborough, NY; b. Abt. 1808, Plymouth, Chenango Co, NY³⁴; d. March 19, 1875, Greene Twp, Trumbull Co, OH at age 67, interred Greenlawn Cemetery; m. (2) ELIZABETH G. "LIZZY" AYERS, Abt. 1876, Ohio; b. June 1834, Stark Co, OH; d. 1913.

Notes for ORIN CORY:

1830 census - not yet found. Orin would be about age 26.

1840 census, Greene, Trumbull Co, OH: Orin Corey, age 30-39, with 2 males under 5 and 1 male age 10-15. His presumed wife was age 30-40. He lived near his brother Cyrus Cory and also Edward Bailey (perhaps a relative of his mother).

1850 census, Greene Twp, Trumbull Co, OH (M432_733, p. 356): Orrin Corey (41), farmer, Polly Corey (43), and their children John (12), Nelson (11), Dwight (8), Lois (7), Sylvia (5), Charles (3), and Mary (1). Mary P. Corey (66) also lived with the family. Value of property in 1850 was listed as \$4,000.

1860 census, Greene Twp, Trumbull Co, OH: Orrin Cory (50), Pollie Cory (52) wife, and children Nelson (20), Dwight (18), Louise (17), Sylvia (16), Chas (13), Mary (12), and Avangeline (10). The household also included Jerome (23) nephew, and John (21), relationship uncertain. The birth dates for children are from "The Branching Tree" (vrichter, updated 28 Oct 2003) and verified by the names and dates on the 1850 and 1860 U.S. census records. On this record, Orrin was a farmer and had property valued at \$3000 and \$1900. Nelson was a school teacher and Dwight was a farmer. Louise was a student. Jerome's occupation was "domestic" while John was a student.

1870 census, Greene, Trumbull Co, OH: Orrin Cory (60), wife Polly (63), and daughters Mary (22) and Eva (17). Property was valued at \$4700 and personal property was \$3160. Orin was listed as farmer.

1880 census, Greene, Trumbull Co, OH: Orin (70) and Lizzie (48) Cory. His occupation was retired farmer.

1900 census, Greene, Trumbull Co, OH: Orin Cory (90) and Elizabeth G. Cory (60). He was listed as "capitalist" and he owned his home.

Notes for MARY "POLLY" PHILLIPS: The Cory Family website shows her birth date as 9 Feb 1800, but this contradicts three census records. In 1850 her age is given as 43; in 1860 her age is 52, and in 1870 her age is 63. These census records put her birth date as 1807-08.

- ii. IRA CORY, b. September 1806, Derby Line, Orleans Co, VT; d. Aft. 1880, Prob. Vermont; m. ADELINE ROBBINS, Abt. 1830³⁵; b. Abt. 1808, New Hampshire; d. Aft. 1880.

Notes for IRA CORY:

1860 census - not found

1870 census - not found

1880 census, Derby, Orleans Co, VT: Ira Corey (76) and Adeline Corey (70) were listed in the household of Luther House (43) and family. Their relationship is unknown.

- iii. CYRUS "SILAS" CORY, b. November 1807, Derby Line, Orleans Co, VT; d. Bet. 1870 - 1880, Prob. Michigan; m. SOPHIA HAYFORD, April 02, 1836, Greene Twp, Trumbull Co, OH³⁶; b. Abt. 1810, Lower Canada; d. October 28, 1892, Colorado, probably Denver.

Notes for CYRUS "SILAS" CORY:

1840 census, Greene, Trumbull Co, OH: Cyrus Cory (age 30-39) with 2 males under 5 and his presumed wife Sophia (age 20-30). The two males are probably their son Jerome, and her son Hiram Dexter from her first marriage. Note that Sophia's former in-laws were in the same township, listed on the same page as Cyrus Corey. 1850 census, Greene, Trumbull Co, OH: Cyrus Cory (43) lived in the household of Horatio (42) and Caroline (42) Bascomb and their 6 children. Also in the household were Alvin Bailey (11), Caroline Newell (60), Angeline Hoyt (36) and Martha B. Hoyt (10). (Note that his family lived in the same town but not with him).

1860 census - Cyrus has not been found. Cyrus is said to have deserted his family and four small children before 1860 and moved to Michigan (source: Brenda Nolan).

1870 census, Pompeii PO, Washington, Gratiot Co, MI: Cyrus Corey (62) lived alone and was a farmer. Property valued at \$4000.

Notes for SOPHIA HAYFORD: In about 1835, Sophia Hayford, widow of Hiram Key (1806-1833), married Cyrus Cory. It would be interesting to find out more about how they met and how Sophia lived with her young son after her first husband died. She might have lived with Hiram's parents.

1850 census, Greene, Trumbull, Ohio: Sophia Corey (40) with her children Jerome (13), Mary (11), Maria (7), Robert (6), and Olive (3). Also Caroline Patton (20) and Lewis Patton (25). Under occupation the census taker wrote "Unimproved land" and her real estate was valued at \$1000. Lewis was a laborer.

1860 census, Greensburg, Trumbull, Ohio: Sophia Cory (40) with children Maria (15), Robert (13) and Olive (11). Sophia had personal property valued at \$300. Her son Jerome was living with his uncle Orin and family in the same township.

1870 census - not yet found - Sophia has not been located in 1870, but her children were moving away from Ohio by 1870.

1880 census, Wellington, Sumner Co, KS: Sophia Cory (69) was listed with her son Jerome's family. She was a Carpet Weaver. The next day, June 2, she was shown living alone in the same town as a widow.

- iv. EUNICE CORY, b. November 21, 1807, Derby Line, Orleans Co, Vermont³⁷; d. April 02, 1887, Leanna KS, near Chanute³⁸; m. (1) ANSEL PATTERSON, JR., February 05, 1828, Vermont, probably Orleans Co.; b. March 1804, Vermont, probably Barre; d. April 02, 1839, Gallia Co (now Vinton), Ohio, age 35y 20d, buried in Markum Cemetery, Bloomfield Twp, Jackson Co, OH; m. (2) JOHN JOHNSON, November 11, 1841, Jackson Co, Ohio³⁹; b. January 16, 1779, Pennsylvania⁴⁰; d. September 24, 1862, McArthur, Vinton Co, OH, aged 76.

Notes for EUNICE CORY: Family tradition is that Eunice's family was an old family. After Ansel's untimely death, Eunice married a neighbor, John Johnson. After Johnson's death, his son Henry took Eunice to court accusing her of embezzling money that belonged to the estate.

1840 census, Clinton, Jackson Co, OH: Eunice is probably the woman, age 30-40, living with John Johnson in Clinton, Vinton Co, OH; His first wife died in 1836. The children listed in John Johnson's household include 1 boy, age 5-10, a male, 20-30, and 4 girls ages 5-20.

1850 census, Vinton Co, OH: John (66) and Unis (38) Johnson with his son William (15) and their daughters Emily (6) and Christiana (2). Also listed were Mary (14) and Sophrona (11) Patterson. John was a farmer. Between 1841 - 1862, Eunice lived in Hamden Station, McArthur, Vinton Co, OH.

1860 census, Reeds Mill, Clinton, Vinton, Ohio: John (74) and Eunice (72) Johnston with daughters Emily (16) and Christenia (12). John was a farmer and Emily was a servant. They had property worth \$800 and \$625.

1870 census, Auglaize, York Twp, Van Wert Co, OH: Catherine Knapp (41), Wallis Knapp (19), Josephine Knapp (16), Sophronia Knapp (13), Eunice Johnson (63), and a domestic servant Samantha Knox (19).

1880 census: Eunice was living in York Twp, Van Wert Co, Ohio with her daughter, Catherine Knapp, in 1880 and Catherine's two children, Wallace and Josephine. Eventually she moved to Leanna, Kansas and lived with Aaron Reed and Mary Bailey Patterson (her daughter).

Eunice was buried on April 03, 1887 in Leanna Cemetery, Leanna Neosho Co, KS under the name Eunice Johnson.

Notes for ANSEL PATTERSON, JR.: The exact date when Ansel and Eunice moved to Ohio has not been found, but it's likely that he moved with his brothers to Trumbull Co in 1834, along with several members of the Cory family. Ansel Patterson is found in a listing of "Entrymen on Lands" in Jackson Co, OH. The sale date was 22 April 1839 in Gallia County for 40.45 acres. This purchase was recorded at the Land Office in Chillicothe (source: Certificate #11149 from the General Land Office). The legal land description showed it was part of the Ohio River Survey (Act of 24 April 1820), 6N Township, 18W Range, Section #1. On this land record, he is listed as "of Gallia County, Ohio." Ansel left no will and clearly he died suddenly and prematurely, perhaps from a farming accident or illness.

1830 census - not found

Notes for JOHN JOHNSON: According to a descendant, John served in the War of 1812 (phone conversation with Vivian Pencin, 1 Sept 2003). John had a land patent registered July 01, 1831 in Jackson Co, OH in McArthur (Twp. 5), on almost 81 acres (source: General Land Office, Chillicothe, OH, Certificate #1524). A biography of John Johnson (unknown source, photocopy) states that after John and Eunice married, they settled on 80 acres of land about 5 miles northeast of Hamden, not far from the John Tarr family near Puritan. Administrator of John's estate was his son, Henry Johnson. When inventory was taken, there was \$213.90 cash on hand. He was buried on September 26, 1862 in Tarr Cemetery, Clinton Twp, Vinton Co, OH.

- v. CHARLES C. CORY, JR., b. October 1808, Derby Line, Orleans Co, VT; d. May 13, 1884, Georgetown, Ottawa, Michigan, buried in Jenison Cemetery; m. MARY A. NOBLES, Abt. 1857, Michigan; b. May 24, 1827, New York; d. July 15, 1879, Ottawa Co., Mi, age 52, buried in Jenison Cemetery.

Notes for CHARLES C. CORY, JR.: This might be the Charles Cory listed on the 1840 census in Waterford, Washington Co, OH. The head of household on this record was born 1800-1810 and he has 3 males listed. One

male under 5, 2 males 15-20, and 2 males 20-30. Some of these may be his younger brothers. There is also one female age 40-50, 2 age 20-30, and 1 age 10-15. These may be his younger sisters. Charles' older brother, Orin, does not appear nearby.

1850 census, Georgetown, Ottawa, Michigan: C. Cory (37) was head of the household that included Elias De Kolyer (22) and his wife Maria (21), both from Holland. Charles was a farmer.

1860 census, Georgetown, Ottawa, Michigan: Charles (47) and Mary A. (32) Cory with children Rensler P. (1) and Sherman (2m). William Wipple (20) was listed as farm laborer. Property was valued at \$2000 and \$600.

1870 census, Holland PO, Georgetown, Ottawa, MI: Charles (57) and Mary (43) Cory with children Ransler (11), Colman (10), and Amelia (5). Charles was a farmer with property worth \$4000 and \$1200.

1880 census, Georgetown, Ottawa, MI: Charles Cory (68) with children Rensalor (21), Colman (19) and Amelia (15). Also listed was Mary R. Gilrush (24).

- vi. COLMAN SMITH CORY, b. November 1810, Derby Line, VT; d. Bet. 1890 - 1900, Unknown death place, interred Fairview Cemetery, Joplin, MO; m. THERESA "THURSEY" CARTER, December 03, 1854, Laclede, MO⁴¹; b. August 17, 1834, Kentucky; d. May 08, 1911, Joplin, Jasper Co, MO, interred Fairview Cemetery.

Notes for COLMAN SMITH CORY:

On the 1810 census, there were only 3 boys under 10 listed, so I assume Colman was born after the 1810 census was taken.

1850 census - not found

1860 census, Dry Glaze, Hooker, Laclede, MO: Coleman (37) and Thersey (26) Cory with children Willis (4), Gabrilla (2), and Sylva (4m). Colman was a farmer with property worth \$900 and \$250.

1870 census, Proctor PO, Warren, Camden, Missouri: C.S. (51) and Thurzy (37) Cory with children Willis H. (14), Calperna (13), Susan (4), and Tennessee (3). Colman was a farmer with property worth \$1100 and \$660.

1880 census, Warren, Camden Co, MO: Coleman (68) and Thursey (35) Cory with children Willis (24), Laura (14), Tennessee (11), and Charles (9). Coleman was a farmer.

1890 - Pension file shows he lived in Decaturville, Warren Twp, MO. He served as a Private in L Company during the Civil War. Colman suffered from kidney disease.

1900 census, Galena, Jasper Co, MO: Thersa Corey (65) was a widow. In her household was daughter Laura (33), a widow, with her two children Zoney (7) and Loney (5). Also listed were Tina Corey (30) and Charles Corey (28), a teamster. This record shows Thersa had 7 children with 5 living. No occupation.

1910 census, Joplin Ward 2, Jasper, Missouri: Thursie Corey (76) lived with her daughter Tennie Carey (39) and family.

- vii. SYLVIA CORY, b. Abt. 1812, Derby Line, Orleans Co, VT; d. Aft. 1880; m. GEORGE RAYMOND, October 11, 1838, Derby, VT by N. Nichols, Minister⁴²; b. Abt. 1802, Massachusetts.
- viii. SYLVESTER P. CORY, b. September 1814, Derby Line, Orleans Co, VT⁴³; d. Aft. 1870; m. (1) UNKNOWN; m. (2) LYDIA LAYLOR, September 19, 1855, Cavendish, Vermont⁴⁴; b. Abt. 1836, Canada.

Notes for SYLVESTER P. CORY:

1860 census (8 June), Marlow, Cheshire, NH: Sylvester (41) and Lydia (24) Corey with children Elizabeth N. (3) and Frederick W. (9m). Sylvester was a house painter with property valued at \$511.

1870 census, Croydon, Plainfield, Sullivan, New Hampshire: Sylvester Cory (61) and his daughter Adelaide (10) lived with Jabez and Eliza Porter.

Sylvester and Lydia were divorced Jan 1868 in New Hampshire.

- ix. ELIZABETH K. CORY, b. February 1816, Derby Line, Orleans Co, VT; m. UNKNOWN KNIGHT.
