2. GERHARD DANIEL² CUCK (UNKNOWN¹) was born 1740 in Germany?, and died Bet. 1791 - 1793 in Camp [now Germantown], Columbia Co, NY, interred under the pulpit of the German Reformed Church, Columbia Co, NY¹. He married CHRISTINA TENBROECK October 31, 1769 in Linlithgo, Columbia, New York^{2,3}, daughter of JACOB TENBROECK and CHRISTINA VAN ALEN. She was born 1742 in NY, and died Aft. June 1793 in prob. Germantown, NY.

Notes for GERHARD DANIEL CUCK: "Gerhard Daniel Cock came to America on invitation of the Camp church in November, 1763, and at once took charge of both churches [Camp and Rhinebeck Reformed]. He recorded his first baptism in the Rhinebeck church on the 11th December, 1763, and his last on the 24th July, 1791. In this pastorate of twenty-eight years his record is unbroken - kept in a legible hand, and in a clear and orderly manner. He baptized one thousand eight hundred and nineteen children, seven hundred of them between the years 1775 and 1785, the period which embraced the seven years of the Revolutionary war. In this list of baptisms there were ten pairs of twins, and eight children born out of wedlock. He died at the Camp, now Germantown, in Columbia county, and was buried under the pulpit of the church there. The balance of salary due him was paid to his widow.... At the close of Cock's pastorate, between July, 24, 1791, and June 15, 1794, there are twenty-four baptisms in an unknown hand" (Morse, 1908, pp. 112 - 113). Later in the same book, Cock is referred to as "of the Camp and German Reformed churches" (p. 131). Still later, in a discussion of the Lutheran (Stone) Church, the author wrote, "The officers in this church were regularly elected in 1772 and 1773, and installed by Gerhard Daniel Cock, still of the Camp and Rhinebeck German Reformed churches" (p. 132). To understand where Cock worked, one must understand that until 1812, the northern section of Rhinebeck was what is now Red Hook. A Dutch Reformed Church was founded in Red Hook in 1785 (Morse, 1908, p. 135).

The following information about Gerhard Daniel Cock was copied from a book at the Germantown parsonage: "Gerhard Daniel Cock, third member of this triumvirate [Fryenmoet and Rysdyck the other two], came to this country in 1762 or '63 in response to a call from the reformed churches at the Camp (Germantown) and Rhinebeck. This call was handled by the Amsterdam Classis who duly examined Cock and ordained him to the work in America, his ordination having taken place on October 4, 1762. This pastor had already served with Fryenmoet on a committee dealing with Van Hovensberg at the meeting of the Conferentie held at Poughkeepsie, June 21, 1764, and thus must have had a better than casual knowledge of the state of affairs existing in the area under the controversial individual's care. Cock seems to have come from a German background and his services were always in demand in surrounding churches, whenever a Germanic, or Palatine, element was to be found in the congregation. There are few churches indeed in this area whose books do not boast at least a few entries in his handwriting. This same handwriting is of a nature that, once seen, cannot well be mistaken; highly individualistic, very legible, and carefully written. These entries stand out wherever found."

The following short biography of Cock appeared in a pamphlet published for the 250th Anniversary of the Reformed Church of Germantown (no author listed). "This pastor came to America in November of 1763, and served the East Camp and Rhinebeck churches until he departed this life in 1791, one of the longest pastorates recorded on the books. Sometime prior to 1770 he married Christina Ten Broeck - the baptism of their child, Jacob, is recorded under that date. There are some 900 baptisms recorded in Cock's highly individualistic and legible handwriting, this according to one count. Sometime during the year of Cock's arrival the rear portion of the Parsonage lands was acquired by the church and it was also during his pastorate that the frame portion of the parsonage building was erected in 1767. During his long pastorate there were few churches in the area, especially those with a German element in the congregation, whose books do not contain entries in his handwriting. Cock served the entire area ably and well until his death in 1791. His remains were entombed beneath the pulpit of the church in Old Queensbury."

"One of the pastors of the Dutch Reformed church in Germantown, Rev. Gerhard Daniel Cock, having attended a council, Oct. 9, 1764, at Kingston, for the purpose of harmonizing differences which had arisen in the church of that place, found himself suddenly in trouble the next morning. He was arrested on a warrant issued by John Hardenburgh and Levi Pauling, justices of the peace for the county of Ulster, and charging the astonished peace-maker with being "a dangerous person to the Government, and a common disturber of the Peace of his Majesty's Liege subjects." He was thereupon required to take the oaths of allegiance and supremacy, all of which he was entirely willing to do, and was forthwith discharged. Learning not long after that they had no rightful authority to do anything of the kind, and that the move was only a stratagem of one of the parties to the church quarrel, he forthwith drew up a petition to the provincial governor asking for the removal of the said justices from office, on the ground that they had made "a presumptuous perversion and abuse of the power intrusted with the said Justices for the public good." History fails to show whether the justices cleared themselves before the council for their extra-judicial ecclesiastical proceedings, or whether they were "obliged to step down and out" (http://www.usgennet.org/usa/ny/county/columbia/gtown/rfmd_gtown.htm). Kingston is located 59 miles south of Albany, along the Hudson River.

In the written records, Gerhard Daniel Cuck is called Reverend or Domini. He "came to this country in response to a call from the German Reformed congregation of the Camp and Rhinebeck in November, 1763, and was pastor of these churches up to his death... He was frequently called to officiate in surrounding churches, particularly where there was a Palatinate element, and few church books but have some entries in his peculiar handwriting. He was systematic and faithful, and during the years 1775 - 85 as one of the few settled ministers in those troublous days, he exercised a wise supervision over pastorless churches. Though participating in the earlier councils of the Dutch Reformed Church, he never united with its Classes or General Synod. He and his churches were independent" (source: Drury, 1881). In another source, LeFevre (1909) wrote about the variations in spelling of surnames in the Kingston Church Registers due to the various ministers who kept records. "... Domine Cock, of East Camp, an advisory friend of the Kingston church, who during the 'Coetus' and 'Conferentie' difficulties, repeatedly officiated there at baptismal and marriage ceremonies..." (p. 57). ML Cook note: In my files are pages from the records of the Kingston Church. I found that he baptized individuals at the Kingston church through 1775, but I did not find records after that date. In 1777, the British burned Kingston. Except for the stone structures, the town was nearly destroyed.

A story about New York Governor George Clinton appeared in "Olde Ulster" (Vol. IV, No. 3, March 1908, p. 68). The story does not indicate how he became acquainted with Rev. Cock but it seems likely that they met when Cock served the Kingston Reformed Church and Clinton served as a member of the colonial assembly from 1768-1775. Kingston was the county seat of Ulster, and Clinton must have spent much time there because he met and wooed Cornelia Tappan. "On the evening of Wednesday, the 7th of February, 1770, in company with Anthony Hoffman and Miss Jannitje Wynkoop, of Kingston, George Clinton took his betrothed upon a sleigh ride. They drove to the north to Katsbaan, some fourteen miles, thence to the river at West Camp and across on the ice to what was then known as East Camp and is now Germantown, Columbia County, where George Clinton and Cornelia Tappen were pronounced man and wife by the Reverend Gerhard Daniel Cock (Koch), the pastor of the Reformed Church in that place. It was a drive of nearly twenty miles, making a forty mile wedding trip that evening."

Cuck was naturalized as a citizen of the United States on 29 July 1773. "The church of Claverack at that time (and indeed from 1770) was without a pastor. Rev. Gerhard Daniel Cock, settled over the churches at Germantown and Rhinebeck, seems, more frequently than any other minister, to have supplied their pulpit. He it was who came out to Squampamock and officiated at the dedication of the new church, and installed the first consistory.... The 28th of

March that year [1775] fell, we find, on Tuesday, so that we can conceive Dominie Cock officiating at Claverack on Sunday, and coming on Monday from thence to the house of the chief promoter of the new enterprise, Mr. Lawrence Hogeboom, residing in a stone house near the site of the present residence of Hon. J.T. Hogeboom. In coming thither in those days, on horseback, and followed the road that yet winds through the beautiful valley of the Squampamock.... On Tuesday, March 28, in the presence of Dominie Cock and the consistory of the church of Claverack, the new church was organized.... Service was held for the first time on Wednesday, March 29, when Dominie Cock installed the consistory and preached from the text, Rev. iii. 18: 'I counsel thee to buy of me gold tried in the fire, that thou mayest be rich; and white raiment, that thou mayest be clothed, and that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear; and anoint thine eyes with eyesalve, that thou mayest see.' ... Thus was the Low Dutch Reformed church of Squampamock inaugurated" (Ellis, 1878, 335-339).

"Inventory from the estate of Jacob Ten Broeck; November 12, 1781. In Dutch. Jacob (1745-1780) was the son of Jacob (1700-d. after 1754) and grandson of Wessel (1664-1747). Inventory of accounts between Jacob Ten Broeck (1745-1780) and his brother, John (1729-1784), and receipts of settlement signed by John's widow, Gerretje (nee Roseboom), and Jacob's executor, Gerret (Gerhard) Daniel Cock, January 12, 1787. (Cock's wife, Christina, was Jacob's sister; Jacob's wife, Anna Elisabeth, was Cock's sister) Kortz, James, and Anna, his wife, of the Town of Kingston" (source: Abraham Van Vechten Legal Papers, 1686-1867, New York State Library).

Hunting (1897) addressed the German Reformers who worshipped at the Round Top Lutheran Church and, in 1772, they built a church on the Pulver farm about two miles east of Pine Plains on the road to Salisbury. "The church was painted red and was known as the 'red church' and later as the 'old red church.'" Hunting goes on to write about a historically important communion service which he believes was taken by the German Reformers from the Round Top Church when they built their own church, whose preachers "were from the parent church at Rhinebeck. Rev. Gerhard Daniel Koch was pastor of the German Reformed Church at Rhinebeck from 1773 to 1791, and he was the first preacher of that denomination in the old Red Church. Hence it was called "Koch's meeting house" (p. 152).

Gerhard Daniel Cock wrote his will in German Camp, NY on 8 Aug 1791, and it was probated 13 June 1793. It mentions his wife Christina and 3 sons, Garrett, Daniel, and Abraham; daughter Christina. Executor: Wife Christina, Hendrick Benner, Jr. and Garrett Cock. Witnesses: William Wheeler, Henry Davis, Peter Sharp.

1790 census, Germantown, Columbia Co, NY: Gerrit D. Cook with 2 males age 16+, 2 males under 16, 2 females and 4 slaves. Clermont was on the same page, so it was nearby. Totals in Germantown: 110 white males 16+; 127 white males under 16 years, 231 white females. ML Cook note: while researching my ancestor in New York, I learned that one of his slaves was named Peter. Rev. Cock accused Peter of stealing some leather and Peter was punished with 39 lashes. No other information about Peter was given in this reference that included several court cases.

Notes for JACOB J. TENBROECK: Baptized at Kaatsban on 21 April 1747 (Van Allen Annex, 2014).

4. GARRET³ CUCK (*GERHARD DANIEL*², *UNKNOWN*¹) was born August 06, 1772 in Germantown, Columbia Co, NY, and died August 09, 1846 in Root, Montgomery Co, NY, 74 years, interred Root Center (Currytown Reformed Church Cemetery), Currytown, West of Church in Churchyard⁵. He married CATHERINE "CATY" BENNER November 08, 1801 in Germantown, Columbia, NY⁶, daughter of HENDRICH BENNER and CATHERINE PITCHER. She was born April 24, 1781 in Germantown, Columbia Co, NY, and died July 24, 1839 in Root, Montgomery Co, NY, age 58y 3m, interred Currytown, West of Church in Churchyard.

Notes for GARRET CUCK: Baptized 15 May 1774.

Garrett was town supervisor in Germantown during 1802 - 1804, and Clermont, NY town supervisor in 1813 and 1818. He was a member of the Assembly of NY in 1817 (source: Ellis, F., 1878, History of Columbia County, New York, Philadelphia: Everts & Ensign). When and why did he move to Red Hook? Why did he move to Montgomery Co, NY after 1830? Remember that his brother, Dr. Daniel Cuck, also lived in Montgomery County.

In about 1807, Garret transferred his membership from the German Church at Camp to the Red Hook Church under the pastorate of Andrew N. Kittle (Smith, 1881, p. 130).

Leonard (2012) wrote about slaves who joined St. John's Church in Upper Red Hook. In 1821, Nancy, wife of Jabez Davis, joined - she was called "a colored woman of G. Cuck."

The following description of American Manners was found: "Both Rhinebeck and Poughkeepsie, originally peopled by the Dutch, still resemble very much Dutch towns. Rhinebeck is upon a fine plain, at a considerable height above the Hudson, from which it is about two miles distant. We left Rhinebeck early in the morning, with the thermometer at 45°, and went on to a small hotel about a mile beyond Redhook, about eleven miles, to breakfast, for which we were quite ready when we got there. We knocked at the door, but no one answered. At length the master of the house, Garret Cucks, appeared. His family had breakfasted, and his son and daughter were teaching at a Sunday-school, a quarter of a mile off. He would go for them, and quickly get all we required. He was as good as his word. A blazing fire was soon made, and as comfortable a breakfast produced as we had enjoyed during the whole course of our journey. Eight eggs were set down for two persons, and preserves of peach and pear. The family remarked us admiring their apples in the orchard before we left them, and offered us as many as we could carry away. We accepted of a few, but enough for our use during our journey. The kindness and hospitality of the Americans are quite unostentatious." ... "Before leaving the house of Mr Cucks, we had the pleasure of seeing him and his family set off in their own carriage, drawn by a couple of horses, for the church at Rhinebeck, although hardly a mile distant ; and the coldness of the day would have led us very much to prefer a walk for such a distance, to a ride in an open carriage; but custom regulates everything, and no one walks in this country. We proceeded on our journey soon after Mr Cucks took his departure, expecting to reach the city of Hudson in time for the afternoon assembling of the church" (source: Three Years in North America, Vol. 1 (1833) by James Stuart, Esq., London: Edinburgh & Whittaker and Co., p. 472 & p. 490). ML note: During my research trip to Dutchess County, NY in 2014, I asked

the genealogy assistant at Elmendorf Inn about a possible location of Garret's hotel. She said there was an inn called "Thomas Inn" near St. John's Reformed Church on the corner of Spring Lake Road. This could have been Cuck's Inn.

1800 census, Germantown, Columbia, New York: Garret Cock (26-44), with 1 male (16-25), 1 female (16-25), and 1 female (26-44); also 3 slaves. ML Note: Garret was age 28 here so I wonder three of his siblings lived with him. He and Caty were not yet married in 1800. Note also that his mother was not in his household in 1800.

1810 census - In 2014, I went through all 6 pages of Germantown and Clermont; Garret Cock/Cuck was not listed.

1820 census - not found but should be in Dutchess Co.

1830 census, Red Hook, Dutchess Co, NY: Garrit Cock (50-60) with a boy (5-10), a boy (15-30), and a young man (20-30). There were 5 females: ages 10-15, 15-20, 20-30, 40-50, and 50-60.

1840 census, Root, Montgomery Co, NY: Garrit Cuck (age 60-70) with a male age 20-30 and a male age 30-40. There were 2 females age 15-20 and a female age 50-60.

"Jennie Ambler (now Mrs. Horton D. Wright) married John Lawton. John Lawton and Jennie Ambler are this writers mother and father. Jennie Ambler descends from Cornelius Maes Van Buren ancestor of the President through Christina Ten Broeck Cock, mother of Garret Cuck (Cook). Eliza Catherine Cuck, daughter of Garret Cuck, was baptized July 18, 1807 at the Reformed Church, Glen, N.Y., County of Montgomery. She married Enoch Ambler of Curreytown, N.Y. at the Reformed Church of Lawyerville, Schoharie County, N.Y., on January 1, 1835 and they thereafter resided in Curreytown for more than two decades. The actual home of the Ambler farm was part of the village of Curreytown itself. Garret Cuck, father of Eliza Catherine (Eliza C in the Deeds of Montgomery County), held the mortgage on the Ambler farm. On the 28th of May 1846 in the presence of Samuel S. Schuyler of Montgomery County, N.Y., he acknowledged the mortgage "satisfied". Garret Cuck died August 9, 1846 and was buried in the church yard at Currytown NY next to wife Catherine Benner, mother of Eliza Catherine. On August 29, 1846 the satisfaction of the mortgage was recorded in Book 34 of Mortgages, pg 499, Montgomery County" (Posted by: James F. Lawton, August 09, 2000, GenForum).

Notes for CATHERINE "CATY" BENNER: Baptized May 27, 1781, St. Paul's Lutheran Church of Red Hook, sponsors were Zacharias Voland and Margaretha Bender his wife (source: Giancola, P.).

1850 census, Root, Montgomery, New York: Christina Cook (36) lived with 3 of her siblings.
1860 census, Sennett, Cayuga Co, NY: Tenbroek Cook (40) with siblings Margaret (42) Cook, Christina Cook (46) and Daniel Cook (57). The head was a farmer with property valued at \$1007. Margaret was a tailoress, Christina was a laborer, and Daniel was a farmer.
1870 census, Moravia, Owasco, Cayuga, New York: Christina Cook (55) lived with her brother TenBroeck Cook and family.
1880 census, Owasco, Cayuga, NY: Tenbrock (61) and Jane (40) Cook with children Maurice (16), Arabella (13), and Edward (9). His sister, Christiana Cook (66) lived with them. Tenbrock was a farmer.

1850 census, Root, Montgomery, New York: Margaret Cook (32) lived with 3 of her siblings.

1860 census, Sennett, Cayuga Co, NY: Tenbroek Cook (40) with siblings Margaret (42) Cook, Christina Cook (46) and Daniel Cook (57). The head was a farmer with property valued at \$1007. Margaret was a tailor, Christina was a laborer, and Daniel was a farmer.

1870 census, Pine Plains, Dutchess County, NY: Margaret Cook (45) was a domestic servant for Cyrus and Betsy Burnap. Cyrus was a wealthy retired farmer with property valued at \$15,500 and \$20,000.

1880 census, Pine Plains, Dutchess, New York: Margaret Cook (60) was a housekeeper for the Jordan family.

DANIEL³ CUCK, M.D. (*GERHARD DANIEL*², *UNKNOWN*¹) was born August 01, 1777 in Upper Red Hook, Dutchess Co, NY⁹, and died November 01, 1829 in NY, age 51-6-0, interred Reformed Church Cemetery, Upper Red Hook¹⁰. He was the owner of the first one-horse wagon in this vicinity, which at the time was a great novelty. Dr. Cuck was also engaged in mercantile business in company with C.C. Hubbard. They were also manufacturers of potash from house ashes. Their store was thought to be an extensive institution, though a small affair compared with many mercantile houses of the present" (p. 164).

Notes for ENOCH AMBLER: "ENOCH AMBLER, INVENTOR OF THE MOWING MACHINE.

Enoch Ambler, formerly a resident of the town of Root, has in his possession letters patent granted December 23, 1834, and executed by Andrew Jackson, President of the United States, securing to him the sole right to a machine of his invention for "cutting hay and grain." His discovery embraced nearly all the most important principles embodied in the machines now sold. The driving-wheel, crank-movement and guards protecting the knife were as now produced, but the knife itself was a straight edged blade, instead of the more efficient saw-toothed scythe of the modern machines. Mr. Ambler unfortunately had less success in introducing his machine than in constructing it, and, himself hardly aware of its immense value, allowed his patent to expire without availing himself of it. The invention was revived, and the great fortune and greater fame which the inventor deserved went to another than Mr. Ambler, who is now an humble resident of Fulton county (source: Threerivers.com - the Town of Root).

"Elijah Morse and James McConnell brought the first mowing-machine into the county. They bought it of the inventor, Enoch Ambler, of Root, Montgomery Co., price \$65. This was in June 1840 or 1841. The machine was known as the "Ambler." It possessed all the elements of the present successful machine- the gearing, the open cap-guard, except the scalloped knife. The knife being straight-edged, vibrating as in the present machine, performed its work as long as the keen edge remained, but on the slightest blunting it refused to cut at all. Parts of this original machine are still to be seen at the farm whereon it was used (source: Smith, James H. *History of Chenango and Madison Counties, New York*. "Town of Eaton." Syracuse, NY: D. Mason & Co., 1880).

From muster To Feb 28th 1862, he is reported present; To June 30/62 absent on det service in Hosp at Capville, since March 11, 1862; July and Aug 1861 to Dec 31/62 - present; Jan and Feb 1863. Missing in action Dec 31/62. "Captured at the battle of Murfreesboro, Tenn., Dec 31/64; paroled at City Point, Va., Jany 26/63; reported at Camp Parole, Md., date not stated and was sent to Benton Bks, Mo., March 11, 1863, where he appears on muster roll as present in March and sick in Hospital April 1863 - date he rejoined company not stated" (source: Illinois GenWeb Civil War Veterans).

His name is on a stone slab at the park at Pea Ridge, Ark., he was at this battle field during the war. Obituary: J.M. Cook

"Word was received Friday after noon of the death of J.M. Cook, which occurred at the Buhel, Idaho Wednesday morning. The funeral party will arrive on the M.K. & T. Saturday evening by way of Emporia, and the body taken to Ellis & Martin's Chapel and held until Sunday morning at which time funeral services will be held from Center Bethel Church, eight miles southeast of Parsons, conducted by Rev. J.M. Kersey, and interment at Springhill Cemetery. Mr. Cook was a former resident of Labette County and resided on a farm in the Center Bethel neighborhood for a great many years. ORA "ORY"⁶ CORK/COOK (*MARGRET⁵ COOK, ADAM HENRY⁴, GARRET³ CUCK, GERHARD DANIEL², UNKNOWN¹*) was born August 18, 1878 in Rossville or Danville, Vermilion, IL¹⁰², and died July 13, 1927 in New Orleans, LA, interred Hammond, LA, age 40. He married MARY M. "MAMIE" THIELSEN October 24, 1907 in New Orleans, LA,

daughter of REGINUS THIELSEN and MARY KELIER/CALIER. She was born August 14, 1881 in Akers, Tangipahoa Co, LA, and died April 21, 1947 in Charity Hospital, New Orleans, LA.

Notes for ORA "ORY" CORK/COOK: Ora was the 7th child and youngest son of John and Margaret Cork. Nothing is known about his childhood in northern Illinois. In July 1899, Ora Cork was bound over to the grand jury for participating in a "white cap" outrage in Rossville, IL, and he was released on a \$300 bond. About a dozen men went to James Briley's house, called him outside, whipped, then covered him with tar (*Daily Commercial Newspaper*, Danville, IL, July 11, 1899 issue), reportedly because Briley had not taken care of his family. The men were accompanied by Henry German, brother of Briley's wife's. In a newspaper article, Ora was called a "Saloon Loafer" and was described as having a "lantern-jawed face" and an unforgettable chin" (Danville Daily News, 12 July, 1899). On the 1900 census, he was listed as Ora Cook, and was living with his sister, Nora Huffer. Did he skip out on his bail and change his name to evade the law? Soon after the "white capper" incident, his parents moved to Mississippi. Did he skip out of town before his trial? His father's obituary in 1905 indicated that Ora was living in Ridgeland, Mississippi. By 1907 he had gone to Louisiana, possibly because he was working as a Pile Driver Engineer and Assistant Bridges Foreman for Illinois Central Railroad. His 1907 marriage license lists Ora's real last name as Cork. In 1910, Ora sold his inheritance from his Uncle Henry, and family tradition is that he and Mamie went to Rossville or Danville about that time. According to his daughter-in-law, Ora and his wife had a car in Hammond before his death - perhaps he bought the car with his inheritance from his uncle Henry C. Cork who died in 1909. His WWI draft registration listed his height as medium and his build as stout, and he had gray eyes and brown hair. Ora died suddenly at the age of 49 of a skull fracture, and his son Roy always told his family that a load of lumber was dropped on him. In fact, Ora was working at a company that made strawberry boxes when he was killed by a fall from a scaffold. Ora did not die immediately, and he was taken to Presbyterian Hospital in New Orleans where he died the next day. His body was returned to Hammond, LA via the Illinois Railroad on 14 Jul 1927 at 3pm.

"Hammond, LA, July 15. Ora Cook suffered a fatal accident Tuesday afternoon at the plant of the Standard Box and Veneer Company. While engaged in the construction of a new unit to the factory a derrick released a large piece of timber which fell upon Mr. Cook, inflicting a fracture of the skull, breaking of his leg, and internal injuries. Rushed to a New Orleans hospital in the ambulance of C. Marvin Poole, the injured man lived until 6 o'clock Wednesday morning. His body was brought here Wednesday night and funeral and burial occurred Thursday. He was for many years associated with the Illinois Central railroad in the construction department. At that time he and his family lived in Ponchatoula. After retiring from railroad service, he moved to Hammond where he has resided for many years. He leaves a widow and several children, among the latter being Ora Cook, Jr." (source: *The State Times*, Friday, July 15, 1927, p. 9A).

On 27 Aug 1927, Mamie, a widow, bought property in Hammond, LA, probably with the inheritance from her husband's estate. Less than two years later, on 8 Apr 1929, a Sheriff's sale of that property was held. Most likely, she lost the property because she could not pay the taxes. Mamie then moved with her family to a rooming house, where she worked cleaning rooms. Family tradition is that she was part Indian. Roy Lee told his family that he was raised Catholic, so it is assumed that Mamie was Catholic. In 1946, the last time her daughter-in-law saw her, she wore her hair in a bun. The informant on Mamie's death certificate was her daughter, Mrs. Charles B. Archer (either Violet or Helen). Her address at death was 107 E. Morris St., Hammond, LA, and cause of death was Gastro-intestinal hemorrhage due to carcinoma of Cecum. According to their death certificates, Ora and Mamie are buried in Ponchatoula Cemetery, Hammond, LA but their markers have not been found.

(22 mos). Mamie's mother, Margaret Tilson (68) was also living with the family. It appears that they lived on S. Church St. with the Timmon family. Ora's occupation looks like Laborer, Railway.

1930 census, 100 Morris Ave, Hammond, LA: Mamie Cook (48), Ory, 21, Charles, 15, Helen, 12, Violet, 9, Roy Lee, 7 years old. Roomers were Jack Jells, Virginia, and his wife Ruth. Mamie was proprietor of the rooming house where rooms rented for \$25.00 per month.

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1940 census, 100 Morris Ave. Hammond, LA: Mamie Cook (57) with children Ora (28), Charles (24), Helen Louise (22), Marie Violet (19), Roylee Joseph (17), and grandson Samuel Claude (5). Mamie was Proprietor, Rooming House, Charles was an Advertising Agent, and Helen was a Saloon Maid.

He was also diagnosed with mild psychosis. On 25 May 1973 he was transferred to the Hillhaven Nursing Home #3 in Gonzales, LA where he later died.

Newspaper story: *Hammond Vindicator*, 18 Nov 1949

"Several have contacted me concerning the sad plight of Ory Cook, who was recently transferred from the hospital at Independence to the Institution at Jackson. Many say that Ory should not be in Jackson, but right here in Hammond where he handled the Times-Picayune for many years, and where his services are missed. It is said that no one cared to accept Ory as a boarder and lodger, hence authorities deemed it wise to let him remain in Jackson. One friend of the boy said that he would donate \$10 toward building Ory a small place in which he could sleep and get his meals at one of the numerous restaurants and cafes. Maybe the Times-Picayune would feel inclined to assist in getting Ory a place to lay his head. He certainly was faithful to the paper over a period of many years."

Another article appeared in the same paper on 2 Dec 1949 indicating that Ory Cook was a "well known newsboy here for many years and who is missed by the citizens in general." This article states that a letter was received stating that Ory was transferred from the East Louisiana Hospital of Jackson. The letter states that Ory was receiving "the best of food, a good place to sleep, and is where he will receive further privileges when he is better." It goes on to state that he is receiving "shots, shocks, and the medicine and help for his affliction."
