1. WESSEL WESSELSE¹ TENBROECK was born Abt. 1600 in Europe.

Notes for WESSEL WESSELSE TENBROECK: Much of my information on this family is taken from Runk, Emma Ten Broeck (1897). *The Ten Broeck Genealogy, Being the records and Annals of Dirck Wesselse Ten Broeck of Albany and his Descendants*. New York: DeVinne Press. According to Runk, due to lack of early records we have only "the honored tradition that Wessel Ten Broeck, the one ancestor of the several branches of the Ten Broeck family in the United States, came to the Colony of New Netherland with Peter Minuit, the first Director General, in 1626" (p. 8).

The Ten Broeck family of early Albany and colonial New York is descended from Wessel Wesselse who came to New Netherland during the 1630s. His son, Dirck Wesselse, became one of the fathers of the city of Albany. His many offspring established the Ten Broeck name in Albany and beyond. By 1697, trader-turned-businessman Wessel Ten Broeck had joined his father on the city census. In 1720, three Ten Broeck men were Albany freeholders. By that time, the family had established itself east of the Hudson on country estates anchored by Dirck Wesselse's estate on the Roelof Jansen Kil. Wessel's son, Dirck Ten Broeck, was appointed mayor of Albany in 1746. He died in 1751. But his widow and three other Ten Broeck households were enumerated on the city census of 1756. Dirck and Margarita's son, General Abraham Ten Broeck, businessman, field officer in the Revolutionary army, and he was third member of the family to serve as mayor of Albany. He was the most widely known family member. He was one of three Ten Broecks who owned homes in the third ward in 1790. The former administrator of Rensselaerswyck, he built Ten Broeck mansion - the historic house headquarters of the Albany County Historical Association. His only son, Dirck, served as speaker of the New York State Assembly in 1798. In 1815, only two Ten Broeck households remained in the city. After Ten Broeck Mansion and the "Ten Broeck Triangle" neighborhood of Arbor Hill, the family is recalled today in the names of numerous public buildings in Albany and beyond.

Notes for WESSEL WESSELSE TENBROECK: His descendants are known as the Kingston Ten Broecks. "He erected the house now known as the 'Senate House of the State of New York' in which the First Constitution of the State was adopted and proclaimed in April, 1777. The house stands in the heart of Kingston, and being now owned by the State, serves as a museum..." (Runk, 1897, p. 9).

3. DIRCK WESSELS² TENBROECK (*WESSEL WESSELSE*¹) was born December 18, 1638 in prob. Europe¹, and died September 18, 1717 in Manor of Livingston, at his Bouwerie, Clermont, Columbia Co, New York, age 78y 9m, interred Ten Broeck Cemetery². He married CHRISTINA VAN BUREN 1663 in Albany, NY at the Dutch Reformed Church, daughter of CORNELIS VAN BUREN and CATALYNTJE VAN ALSTYNE. She was born 1644 in Rensselaerswyck, New York³, and died November 23, 1729 in Albany, NY⁴.

Notes for DIRCK WESSELSE TENBROECK: He is known in history as Maj. Wessel. Dirk made his will in 1715 - it named his wife and 11 surviving children who inherited his huge estate. The will was proved 6 Feb 1718. He was a trader in Albany lots during the 1670s and 1689s. "As early as 1662 he was the largest fur-trader at Beaver-Wyck (now Albany). He was largely engaged in Indian and other public affairs (*Commemorative Biographical Record...*, 1897, p. 166). In the same book, there is a description of his land: "By deed of date October 26, 1694, Robert Livingston conveyed to him a tract of land on both sides of Roeliff Jansen's Kill, containing about 1,200 acres, also a tract on the Hudson river of 600 acres, situated 200 paces south of the old Livingston Manor House" (p. 166).

"Most of the architecturally and historically significant structures in the town of Clermont are closely associated with the Livingston family of the Clermont Estate and its subsequent sub-divisions. The oldest and most significant structure included in the present nomination is the Bouwerie, a pre-Revolutionary War farm complex built for Dick Wesslse Ten Broeck of Albany. Ten Broeck was active in the political affairs of Albany and was a business manager on the Livingston Manor. In 1694, shortly after the creation of the manor, Ten Broeck purchased 1200 acres along the Roeloff Jansen Kill from the first lord of the manor. He built a house, and his grandson and namesake built the imposing brick residence nominated here. This outstanding example of Georgian architecture is the only extant one of its type, period and style in Clermont and one of the very few in the entire region (Source: <http://pdfhost.focus.nps.gov/docs/NRHP/Text/64000544.pdf>).

In 1900, his descendants designed a new monument of Qincey granite, sarcophagus in style, and erected it in the old family burying ground on the Harold Wilson farm in Clermont. On the back was inscribed the following:

Dirck Wesselse Ten Broeck

Appointed Magistrate Commissary of Albany in 1676

Recorder and twice Mayor of the City

Mayor of Militia of Colonial New York

A Member of the Provincial Assembly

An Indian Commissioner and Envoy in the Colony and Canada

The Government and the Dutch Church esteemed him an honorable man and a loyal son (source: Columbia County at the End of the Century, Vol. II, MCM, p. 625).

"He was one of the sons of Wessel Ten Broeck who came with Peter Minuet and about 200 other settlers about 1624 to settle the Hudson River Valley for the Dutch West India Company. Dirck was Indian agent at Albany for about 20 years and also Mayor from 1696 to 1698. For about 20 years he had also been 'The Recorder' at Albany which seems something like a Recording Secretary when the mayor met with his governing council. He married Christina Van Buren, daughter of Cornelius Van Buren and Marritje Van Alstyne and they had about 14 children, 11 of which lived to adulthood. I am descended from daughter Catharine who had two husbands - Jan (John) Leggett, first husband, and then a second husband with a somewhat similar name. Jan (John) Leggett and Catharine had three daughters and a son and I am descended from their daughter Christina, born about 1694 (the first Christina, born in 1691, died before 1694), who married Claude Delamater. Christina Leggett was the only grandchild mentioned in her grandfather Dirck's will. He directed that if she married, her wedding outfit would be paid out of his estate. She married Claude Delamater and their daughter Christina Delamater married Johannes Tobias Van Deusen as his first wife of two. Johannes Tobias Van Deusen and his first wife Christina Delamater (she died in 1769) lived in Claverack, Columbia County, New York. Their son John J. Van Deusen (born in 1759 and baptized in 1761) who married Fytje (Sophia) Hallenbeck was my ancestor through their daughter Maria Van Deusen (born January 1789) who married Leonard Freeland at the Dutch Reformed Church of Claverack, Columbia County, New York in the fall of 1806. Their son John, born July 28, 1807 at Claverack, married a much younger Eliza C. Bryan (born 1823 in Manhattan) at St. Paul's (Episcopal) Chapel in lower Manhattan in July of 1844 when John Freeland (died Dec. 1860) was working as a merchant in the dry goods business with his first cousin, James Freeland (1799 to 1879). Eliza's father was the English born Elijah Bryan who was a dentist in Manhattan. John Augustus Freeland and Eliza C. Bryan only had one daughter, Helena Willett Freeland (my ancestor who was born in 1846 and who married Charles Alger in January of 1866 at Greenport Center, Columbia County, New York) and one son, John Augustus Freeland, Jr., born in 1850 who married Helen (Ella) Harris. Dirck purchased much land in what is now Columbia County and was awarded 1/7 of the Saratoga Patent. He also purchased the home of

Annecke Bogardus in Albany from her estate. Annecke's first husband was Roeloff Jans/Jansen and her second husband was the Rev. Everardus Bogardus. Dirck died at his Bouwerie House on Roelof Jansen Kill on September 18, 1717 at Clermont in what is now Columbia County. The house was his summer house which was built on land granted by Robert Livingston who was also an Indian agent and most important man in the New York Colony (as was Dirck). In his will Dirck left his land holdings in eleven parcels for his eleven sons and daughters. He urged them never to sell the land which unfortunately happened over the years but what was left to his eleven children and then passed on to their descendants kept the family 'comfortable' for many years."

Dirck Wesselse ten Broeck's Will

The will written in Dutch, is on file with others of early date, in the office of the Clerk of the Court of Appeals, in the Albany Capitol.

In the Name of the Lord.

On the fourth day of February, in the first year of our Sovereign King George of Great Britain, &c, and in the year of our Lord 1712, I Dirck Wesselsen ten Broeck, formerly of Albany, now of the Manor of Livingston, being sound in body and mind, having and using my memory, but considering the shortness and frailty of human life, the certainty of death, and uncertain hour thereof, have advisedly, without inducement, persuasion, or misleading by anybody, made, ordained, and concluded, this my last Will and Testament, revoking and annulling hereby all and each Testament formerly by me made and executed. This to be taken as my last Will and Testament as follows:

First. - I commend my immortal soul, whenever it shall leave my body, to the gracious and charitable hands of God, my Creator and Saviour, my body to a Christian burial in the earth, whence it came, and there to remain until the day when my soul and my body shall be re-united, on the day of resurrection, to share in the ineffable joy of eternal bliss, which God in his grace has prepared and promised, through the death of Jesus Christ, for and to all who faithfully believe in Him.

I. Concerning such worldly goods as the Lord has been please to bestow on me, far above my deserts, I give and dispose of them as follows:

II. I give to my eldest son, Wessel ten Broeck, as his privilege of first born son, the sum of three pounds current money of New York; and I desire that he shall make no further claim upon my estate than an equal share, as given hereafter to his Sisters and Brothers.

III. It is further my will and desire, that after my death my honest debts shall be paid by my heirs, in due time.

IV. I appoint my well beloved wife, Christyna Wesselsen ten Broeck, executrix and administratrix of my whole estate, real and personal; lands, houses, lots, bonds, notes, rents, gold and silver, coined and uncoined; jewels, clothing, linen, woolen, horses, cattle, negro slaves, and whatever else, nothing in the world excepted nor reserved from my whole estate, here, in England, Holland or elsewhere, wherever it may be; to administer thereon, without interference of contradiction by my children or anybody else, or that she should be held to give an accounting or inventory during the time of her widowhood; but with this express condition, that she shall not be allowed to sell, alienate, or exchange any of my real estate, wherever it may be, such as lands, houses, lots and mortgages, but only use thereof the fruit and yearly income of which she may dispose during her widowhood. But, if should again marry, she shall be held, before entering anew into the state of matrimony, to surrender the whole estate, according to a sworn inventory, to my sons, to wit: Wessel ten Broeck, Samuel ten Broeck, Johannes ten Broeck and Tobias ten Broeck, whom I then appoint executors of my whole estate, real and personal, to administer thereon.

They shall be held to give to my said wife one third of the yearly revenue, during her life, and the other two thirds, after deducting all expenses, I desire shall by them be equally divided between my eleven children, or their heirs, namely:

Wessel ten Broeck, Elsie ten Broeck, wife of Johannes Cuyler, Catalyntje ten Broeck, wife of John Lissger; Cornelia ten Broeck, wife of Johannes Wynkoop; Geertruy ten Broeck, wife of Abraham Schuyler; Christyna ten Broeck, wife of Johannes Van Alen; Elisabeth ten Broeck, wife of Antony Costar; Lidia ten Broeck, wife of Volkert Van Vechten; Samuel ten Broeck, Johannes ten Broeck, Tobias ten Broeck, each to have one just eleventh share.

V. After the death of my wife, I give to my eldest son Wessel ten Broeck two thirds of all my lands at Saratoga, in the County of Albany; and the other third I give to my daughter Geertruy, wife of Abraham Schuyler. Said lands being the just seventh part of the whole Saratoga patent, granted to me, Col. Peter Schuyler and others. I give this to my said eldest son and to my daughter Geertruy as above said, to wit: two thirds to the said Wessel ten Broeck and his heirs forever, provided that these stretches of pasture land shall be counted as 125 pounds, New York currency, in the share of my said son Wessel ten Broeck, in the estate which I shall have. And likewise the third part given to my said daughter Geertruy shall be counted as 75 pounds, New York currency; which said third part, I give to her, and her heirs, as equivalent to the mentioned sums, forever, after the death of my wife.

VI. Further I give to my sons, Samuel ten Broeck and Tobias ten Broeck, all my lands in the said Manor of Livingston, according to the conveyance to me from Mr. Robert Livingston, to be divided into two equal parts, of which my son Tobias shall first choose his half, and the other half shall go to my son Samuel, and to their respective heirs forever. I also give to my two sons, Samuel and Tobias aforesaid, four horses, four cows, four sheep, four pigs; one of my negroes, to be selected by them; all farming utensils which then shall be found on my bouwery, for which I will that my said sons shall each pay to my said executors the sum of 190 pounds, New York currency, or together 380 pounds provided that each of them may retain the full share of his inheritance from said sum. If their share should not amount to as much, then they add and pay to the administrators the difference. If their share amounts to more, then it shall be paid to them out of the estate; but they shall not be allowed to make a claim on the land here given to them, until after the death of my said wife; then they shall receive as their own the land with houses, barns, brewery, and other privileges.

VII. After my wife's death, I give to my son Johannes ten Broeck, my two houses and lots in the City of Albany; on the north side of Yonkers (State) Street, on the west side of Yaugh (now James Street), on the east side of the house and lot of Antony Costar, and on the south side of said Costar, according to conveyance, to him and his heirs forever. I also give to the said Johannes all my right and title in and to land on the east side of Hudson's River, on a Kil called Kinderhoek Kil, which is not sold yet; according to the patents from Sir Edmond Andros and Colonel Thomas Dongan, - to him, his heirs and assigns forever: which houses and lots, and right and title to land Kinderhoek Kil I value at 200 pounds, New York currency, and I will that so much shall be refunded to the estate, after deducting as much as one eleventh part of the whole shall amount to, and the residue shall be paid to my executors for the behoof of my other heirs; and if his share is larger, then it shall be paid to him by the administrators.

VIII. It is my wish and will, and I give all my other lands, houses, and lots, excepting what as above I have given to my said sons and daughter Geertruy, and all my negro slaves, cattle, and other property of whatsoever nature it may be, after my own and my wife's death, to my said eleven children, to be sold to each, and the proceeds accumulated, which, with the sums to be paid by my sons and daughter, shall then be equally divided among my said eleven children, it being well understood that my said sons and daughter Geertruy, shall not pay more for their land, as appraised by me, than so much as it amounts to, more than their eleventh part of my whole estate.

IX. It is further my wish and will, that none of my real estate shall be sold to strangers, but it shall always remain in my family.

X. It is my wish and will, that Christina Legget, when she comes to marriageable age, shall have a good outfit.

All the above I declare to be my last Will, requesting that it may have full effect in every way.

Thus done and concluded, at my Bouwery, in the Manor of Livingston, and signed and sealed by my own hand this Fourth of February, 1712.

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This will was proved on the sixth of February 1718, A few months later, on September the first, the wife of Major Ten Broeck took steps to have assistance from those she trusted in executing the expressed wishes and will of her husband. She appointed her -

Loving sons, Wessel ten Broeck, Johannis Ten Broeck, and my son-in-law, Johannis Cuyler, all of the City of Albany, to be my true and lawful and irrevokable Attorneys, rendering account to me, when thereunto required; and after my decease, unto the heirs of the said Dirck Wesselse Ten Broeck. signed Christyna Ten Broeck

Witnesses: Hendrick van Rensselaer and Anthony Costar

She out lived her husband a little more than twelve years. Doubtless Albany became again her home during this time, and it was her choice to return to the more familiar place, where she had known many happy years, now the residence of her son Johannes. She died on the twenty fourth of November, 1729, and was interred in the Dutch Church of Albany.

Her parents, Cornelis Maessen Van Buren and Catalyntje Martensen, came to the Colony from Guelderland, Holland, in 1631, in the ship "Arms of Rensselaerwyck." They were probably from Buren, near which is the castle of the counts Buren. They lived on the Manor of Rensselaerwyck, and died there in 1648 both being buried on the same day.

Although the request that real estate shall always remain the family could not in every instance be observed, yet parts of each of these tracts are still the property of descendants.

5. WESSEL³ TENBROECK (*DIRCK WESSELSE*², *WESSEL WESSELSE*¹) was born 1664 in Albany, NY, and died June 08, 1748 in Albany, NY⁷. He married CATTRYNA LOOCKERMANS April 02, 1684 in Albany, NY⁸, daughter of JACOB LOOCKERMANS and TRYNTJE CLAES. She was born August 1669 in NY, and died 1729.

Notes for WESSEL TENBROECK: "These Ten Broecks lived on Market Street where Wessel was a prominent merchant and civic leader" (Bielinski, S., <http://www.nysm.nysed.gov/albany/bios/l/calock5934.html>). His will was written 6 June 1723 and probated 29 Jan 1752. Original manuscript of the will is in Albany Co, NY Records.

The following biography was posted by 2Marcantonio to the McDermott Tree in Ancestry.com: Wessel, the eldest child and son of Major Ten Broeck, married a few days before he was twenty years of age Caatje Loockermans, a maiden of fifteen, the daughter of one of the early men of Albany. They resided in what was called, in those days, the third ward of Albany, and as a merchant and citizen he was active and useful in both public and private life. He first appears in a public capacity in that dangerous period of the change on England's throne, and the uncertainty of authority in her colonies, when, on November the fifth, 1689 "forty of ye inhabitants, principall men of ye town and county of Albany, agreed to keep the Fort and City, for the behoofe of King William and Queen Mary,...promising to assist, if occasion required, for the preservation of Peace and tranquility."

Beginning with January, 1695, he audited, for two years, the deacon's books of the Dutch Church, and in 1697 he kept them, jointly with Hendrick Van Rensselaer. He was present as a church officer and also as a city magistrate, when Dr. Dellius, the pastor, owing to the misunderstanding consequent upon the granting of the famous Mohawk Patent, held his farewll interview with the Indin converts in June, 1698. He signed the petition of the Protestant subjects in the colony to King William the Third, in December 1701.

As a deputy from the city and county of Albany, he greeted Lord Cornbury on his arrival as Governor General in 1702, and was one of those to present to him the address of allegiance and welcome. Wessel Ten Broeck was an alderman of Albany at the time his father served as mayor of the city; he was a member of the Indian Board during the conference with the Five Nations, held in 1701, and almost continuously, for twenty five years, he stood among the men in whom the citizens reposed the public trust. There was constant need for measures of defense in those times, and when in 1700 Lord Bellomont prepared the report of the militia, Wessel Ten Broeck was Lieutenant of a company of foot soldiers uner Colonel Schuyler. He applied for a grant of land, and received the certificate in 1733. It was situated on the west side of the Hudson River, and extended from the Kaaterskill to the banks of the Hudson, about five miles south of Catskill. He mentioned this tract in his will, which was dated June the tenth, 1723 and recorded January the twenty ninth, 1753, in Albany County Clerk's Office, Volume I., page 215.

The family Bible of Wessel Ten Broeck is of great interest; it is in Dutch, printed in 1682 in Dortrecht, Holland. This illustration, and the one on page 150 [see ancestry tree], will give an idea of the size and appearance. Heavy boards, covered with tooled leather, form the binding; the corners are finished with brass pieces, and the book has clasps of the same metal. Between the Old and New Testaments are maps of Asia Minor and Egypt, and also a drawing representing Paradise. The records are found on the boards of the covers and on the blank pages next to these, in both the front and back of the volume. The writing is in Holland Dutch, the earliest date being the marriage of Wessel to "Cattryna Locermans," on the second of April, 1684. The entries pertaining to his children and descendants are very full. The Bible is now the property of a lineal descendant - Mr. Andrew J. Samuel Ten Broeck was born about 1680. He was a son in the large family of Albany leader Dirck Wesselse and Christina Van Buren Ten Broeck. He grew up in the comfortable State Street home and on the emerging east bank farm of one of the most important men in early Albany.

In 1697, he was accounted for in his father's Albany household. In 1699, he joined his Albany neighbors in swearing allegiance to the king of England. However, he seems to have lived on the family farm in eastern Albany County.

In November 1712, he married Maria Van Rensselaer - daughter of the Albany leader of the region's premier New Netherland family. By 1730, seven children had been christened at the Albany Dutch church where the parents were regular baptism sponsors.

In 1715, he was named to inherit a share of his father's estate and a portion of his land on the Roeloff Jansen Kill in Livingston Manor. He settled there and raised a family that included several future residents of Albany.

After more than three decades of success as an Albany County farmer, Samuel Ten Broeck died in April 1756 and was buried from the Albany church.

In the name of God, Amen, I, Cornelius Ten Broeck, of Albany, merchant, being in perfect health. I leave to my son John £60, for his birthright as my heir at law. I leave to my wife Maria the possession of all my estate, real and personal, during the time she remains my widow, "making no waste or destruction."

After her death or marriage, I leave to my son John my dwelling house, storehouse, and lot of ground in the 3rd Ward in Albany, where I now live. I leave to my daughter Catharine, wife of George Wray, a lot of ground to the east and opposite to the above, bounded west by street, north by the house and lot of Schebald Borgardus, south by the house and lot of Abraham Vosburgh, as it was sold to me by Abraham Schuyler, deceased;

Also 2 lots with buildings, as purchased of Frederick Osterman, lying in New York, being houses and lots 10 and 11, fronting Hague Street, bounded west by lot of Peter Grims, as by deed.

If my said daughter and her husband desire to live in Albany, they may build a house on her lot during the life of my wife. I leave to grandson, Cornelius Ten Broeck, Jr., Lot 29, which among others fell to my share in the partition of a certain Patent lying in the County of Albany, on the south side of the Mohawk river, granted to Matthew Young, Edward Holland, myself and others, October 11, 1765; Also 200 acres of land which may be first drawn out of my 3000 acres upon the partition of a Patent which I have in Company with John R. Bleecker, P.Douw, and Lambert Moore.

After the death of my wife I leave to my son John and to my daughter Catharine all the rest of my estate, divided, and if they sell during my wife's life they shall pay 1/3 to her. After my wife's death I leave to my grandson, Cornelius Ten Broeck, Jr., my Negro "Jan" and to my daughter, Jenny, daughter of my daughter Catharine, a Negro girl. I leave to my son John and my daughter Catharine, wife of George Wray, all my plate and household furniture, bedding, cattle and money.

Notes for GEORGE WRAY: George Wray was born in England in 1728, and settled in New York during the French and Indian War. On June 21, 1765, he married Catharina Ten Broeck (b.1737), with whom he had at least three children: John (b.1768), Jennet or Jane (b.1769), and Maria (b.1771). In 1772, he was clerk of stores for the Royal Regiment of Artillery, stationed at New York. He followed the British Army to Boston in 1774, and in December 1775, he became commissary of the Royal Regiment of Artillery, in which capacity he assumed control of issuing and receiving all stores for the artillery. Upon the evacuation of Boston in 1776, Wray went first to Halifax, Nova Scotia, and then to Newport, Rhode Island. On this 23rd day of July 1832 personally appeared in open court before the Justices of the City of Hudson, County & State aforesaid Samuel Ten Broeck a resident of the Town of Livingston in said County, aged eighty six years, who, being duly sworn according to Law, makes the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress as per June 7th, 1832. That he was born in the Town of Claremont in said County, then Albany County, in --- 1745. That in the month of January 1776 he received a Commission of Major in the Militia of the state of New York which he held until the close of the War, when he was advanced regularly until he reached the rank of Brigadier General which he held until he was seventy years of age. Peter R. Livingston was Colonel in his regiment, but this applicant held the command. In 1776 he marched to Schenectady & there received orders from General Schuyler to --- the woods north of Schenectady & to east on to Saratoga. After about a month the Regiment was discharged & he returned home. In 1777 he again was ordered out to Fort Edward in the approach of Burgoyne. He marched --- Schaghticoke Landing, thence to Van Schaicks Island, thence to Bemis Heights or Stillwater. His Regiment on the day of the Battle then went out to reinforce, but the enemy retreated before he came up. He then crossed the River on a floating Bridge, & passed on to (Schuyler Mills?) & remained till Burgoyne surrendered, when his regiment was discharged. He thinks that during the two years he was in actual service with his troops ten full months - And that he was in all times in readiness for the service, & thinks he was during the war in actual service in his own County against the Tories, & elsewhere, a full term of two years or upwards. And he further declares that he has lost or cannot find his --- ---, & he has no documentary testimony, that he hereby relinquishes all claim to any ---- except the present, & his name is not on the pension roll of any State, that he has no person to testify to his services, except his Brother Leonard, whose affidavit is hereto annexed. /s/ Samuel Ten Broeck

Notes for PETRUS "PETER" TENBROECK: "Petrus, the son of Jacob Ten Broeck and Christina Van Alen, married on the thirty-first of March, 1750, Annatje Herchheimer (Herkimer). Through his marriage he was allied to the most influential Germans in the Mohawk Valley, as his wife was a sister of General Nicholas Herkimer, of Revolutionary fame.

The residence was in Montgomery County, NY, as the names and dates of baptism of several of his children stand on the register of the church at Stone Arabia. His name is entered as Major Petrus Ten Broeck at the baptism of the third son, in 1771, showing his standing in the militia at that date.

Under date of October, 1776, he is unfortunately found associated with Johan Jost Schuyler in the following : "Peter Ten Broeck, of the Fall Kill, joined the enemy. He, with Han Yost Schuyler and about twelve others, went to Oswego, hoping to meet the enemy there." A shade more light is thrown on this event by a letter to General Schuyler, which relates how, "After a consultation at Canajoharie Castle among the Indians and Tories, they absconded to the enemy."

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It is doubtful if this plan carried, as Schuyler and others, to the number of twenty-eight, were captured. Major Ten Broeck probably even found a way to avoid being a refugee, as on January the tenth, 1780, he presented his youngest child for baptism at the Germantown Church, Columbia County.

These few unconnected facts regarding the life of Petrus Ten Broeck leave many unsolved problems in their wake, and trace of his children, beyond the following list, cannot be found" (Runk, 1897, p. 101),

Notes for GERHARD DANIEL CUCK: "Gerhard Daniel Cock came to America on invitation of the Camp church in November, 1763, and at once took charge of both churches [Camp and Rhinebeck Reformed]. He recorded his first baptism in the Rhinebeck church on the 11th December, 1763, and his last on the 24th July, 1791. In this pastorate of twenty-eight years his record is unbroken - kept in a legible hand, and in a clear and orderly manner. He baptized one thousand eight hundred and nineteen children, seven hundred of them between the years 1775 and 1785, the period which embraced the seven years of the Revolutionary war. In this list of baptisms there were ten pairs of twins, and eight children born out of wedlock. He died at the Camp, now Germantown, in Columbia county, and was buried under the pulpit of the church there. The balance of salary due him was paid to his widow.... At the close of Cock's pastorate, between July, 24, 1791, and June 15, 1794, there are twenty-four baptisms in an unknown hand" (Morse, 1908, pp. 112 - 113). Later in the same book, Cock is referred to as "of the Camp and German Reformed churches" (p. 131). Still later, in a discussion of the Lutheran (Stone) Church, the author wrote, "The officers in this church were regularly elected in 1772 and 1773, and installed by Gerhard Daniel Cock, still of the Camp and Rhinebeck German Reformed churches" (p. 132). To understand where Cock worked, one must understand that until 1812, the northern section of Rhinebeck was what is now Red Hook. A Dutch Reformed Church was founded in Red Hook in 1785 (Morse, 1908, p. 135).

The following information about Gerhard Daniel Cock was copied from a book at the Germantown parsonage: "Gerhard Daniel Cock, third member of this triumvirate [Fryenmoet and Rysdyck the other two], came to this country in 1762 or '63 in response to a call from the reformed churches at the Camp (Germantown) and Rhinebeck. This call was

handled by the Amsterdam Classis who duly examined Cock and ordained him to the work in America, his ordination having taken place on October 4, 1762. This pastor had already served with Fryenmoet on a committee dealing with Van Hovensberg at the meeting of the Conferentie held at Poughkeepsie, June 21, 1764, and thus must have had a better than casual knowledge of the state of affairs existing in the area under the controversial individual's care. Cock seems to have come from a German background and his services were always in demand in surrounding churches, whenever a Germanic, or Palatine, element was to be found in the congregation. There are few churches indeed in this area whose books do not boast at least a few entries in his handwriting. This same handwriting is of a nature that, once seen, cannot well be mistaken; highly individualistic, very legible, and carefully written. These entries stand out wherever found."

The following short biography of Cock appeared in a pamphlet published for the 250th Anniversary of the Reformed Church of Germantown (no author listed). "This pastor came to America in November of 1763, and served the East Camp and Rhinebeck churches until he departed this life in 1791, one of the longest pastorates recorded on the books. Sometime prior to 1770 he married Christina Ten Broeck - the baptism of their child, Jacob, is recorded under that date. There are some 900 baptisms recorded in Cock's highly individualistic and legible handwriting, this according to one count. Sometime during the year of Cock's arrival the rear portion of the Parsonage lands was acquired by the church and it was also during his pastorate that the frame portion of the parsonage building was erected in 1767. During his long pastorate there were few churches in the area, especially those with a German element in the congregation, whose books do not contain entries in his handwriting. Cock served the entire area ably and well until his death in 1791. His remains were entombed beneath the pulpit of the church in Old Queensbury."

"One of the pastors of the Dutch Reformed church in Germantown, Rev. Gerhard Daniel Cock, having attended a council, Oct. 9, 1764, at Kingston, for the purpose of harmonizing differences which had arisen in the church of that place, found himself suddenly in trouble the next morning. He was arrested on a warrant issued by John Hardenburgh and Levi Pauling, justices of the peace for the county of Ulster, and charging the astonished peace-maker with being "a dangerous person to the Government, and a common disturber of the Peace of his Majesty's Liege subjects." He was thereupon required to take the oaths of allegiance and supremacy, all of which he was entirely willing to do, and was forthwith discharged. Learning not long after that they had no rightful authority to do anything of the kind, and that the move was only a stratagem of one of the parties to the church quarrel, he forthwith drew up a petition to the provincial governor asking for the removal of the said justices from office, on the ground that they had made "a presumptuous perversion and abuse of the power intrusted with the said Justices for the public good." History fails to show whether the justices cleared themselves before the council for their extra-judicial ecclesiastical proceedings, or whether they were "obliged to step down and out" (http://www.usgennet.org/usa/ny/county/columbia/gtown/rfmd_gtown.htm). Kingston is located 59 miles south of Albany, along the Hudson River.

In the written records, Gerhard Daniel Cuck is called Reverend or Domini. He "came to this country in response to a call from the German Reformed congregation of the Camp and Rhinebeck in November, 1763, and was pastor of these churches up to his death... He was frequently called to officiate in surrounding churches, particularly where there was a Palatinate element, and few church books but have some entries in his peculiar handwriting. He was systematic and faithful, and during the years 1775 - 85 as one of the few settled ministers in those troublous days, he exercised a wise supervision over pastorless churches. Though participating in the earlier councils of the Dutch Reformed Church, he never united with its Classes or General Synod. He and his churches were independent" (source: Drury, 1881). In another source, LeFevre (1909) wrote about the variations in spelling of surnames in the Kingston Church Registers due to the various ministers who kept records. "... Domine Cock, of East Camp, an advisory friend of the Kingston church, who during the 'Coetus' and 'Conferentie' difficulties, repeatedly officiated there at baptismal and marriage ceremonies..." (p. 57). ML Cook note: In my files are pages from the records of the Kingston Church. I found that he baptized individuals at the Kingston church through 1775, but I did not find records after that date. In 1777, the British burned Kingston. Except for the stone structures, the town was nearly destroyed.

A story about New York Governor George Clinton appeared in "Olde Ulster" (Vol. IV, No. 3, March 1908, p. 68). The story does not indicate how he became acquainted with Rev. Cock but it seems likely that they met when Cock served the Kingston Reformed Church and Clinton served as a member of the colonial assembly from 1768-1775. Kingston was the county seat of Ulster, and Clinton must have spent much time there because he met and wooed Cornelia Tappan. "On the evening of Wednesday, the 7th of February, 1770, in company with Anthony Hoffman and Miss Jannitje Wynkoop, of Kingston, George Clinton took his betrothed upon a sleigh ride. They drove to the north to Katsbaan, some fourteen miles, thence to the river at West Camp and across on the ice to what was then known as East Camp and is now Germantown, Columbia County, where George Clinton and Cornelia Tappen were pronounced man and wife by the Reverend Gerhard Daniel Cock (Koch), the pastor of the Reformed Church in that place. It was a drive of nearly twenty miles, making a forty mile wedding trip that evening."

Cuck was naturalized as a citizen of the United States on 29 July 1773. "The church of Claverack at that time (and indeed from 1770) was without a pastor. Rev. Gerhard Daniel Cock, settled over the churches at Germantown and Rhinebeck, seems, more frequently than any other minister, to have supplied their pulpit. He it was who came out to Squampamock and officiated at the dedication of the new church, and installed the first consistory.... The 28th of March that year [1775] fell, we find, on Tuesday, so that we can conceive Dominie Cock officiating at Claverack on Sunday, and coming on Monday from thence to the house of the chief promoter of the new enterprise, Mr. Lawrence Hogeboom, residing in a stone house near the site of the present residence of Hon. J.T. Hogeboom. In coming thither in those days, on horseback, and followed the road that yet winds through the beautiful valley of the Squampamock.... On Tuesday, March 28, in the presence of Dominie Cock and the consistory of the church of Claverack, the new church was organized.... Service was held for the first time on Wednesday, March 29, when Dominie Cock installed the consistory and preached from the text, Rev. iii. 18: 'I counsel thee to buy of me gold tried in the fire, that thou mayest be rich; and white raiment, that thou mayest be clothed, and that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear; and annoint thine eyes with eyesalve, that thou mayest see.' ... Thus was the Low Dutch Reformed church of Squampamock inaugurated" (Ellis, 1878, 335-339).

"Inventory from the estate of Jacob Ten Broeck; November 12, 1781. In Dutch. Jacob (1745-1780) was the son of Jacob (1700-d. after 1754) and grandson of Wessel (1664-1747). Inventory of accounts between Jacob Ten Broeck (1745-1780) and his brother, John (1729-1784), and receipts of settlement signed by John's widow, Gerretje (nee Roseboom), and Jacob's executor, Gerret (Gerhard) Daniel Cock, January 12, 1787. (Cock's wife, Christina, was Jacob's sister; Jacob's wife, Anna Elisabeth, was Cock's sister) Kortz, James, and Anna, his wife, of the Town of Kingston" (source: Abraham Van Vechten Legal Papers, 1686-1867, New York State Library).

Huntting (1897) addressed the German Reformers who worshipped at the Round Top Lutheran Church and, in 1772, they built a church on the Pulver farm about two miles east of Pine Plains on the road to Salisbury. "The church was painted red and was known as the 'red church' and later as the 'old red church.'" Huntting goes on to write about a historically important communion service which he believes was taken by the German Reformers from the Round Top Church when they built their own church, whose preachers "were from the parent church at Thinebeck. Rev. Gerhard Daniel Koch was pastor of the German Reformed Church at Rhinebeck from 1773 to 1791, and he was the first preacher of that denomination in the old Red Church. Hence it was called "Koch's meeting house" (p. 152).

Gerhard Daniel Cock wrote his will in German Camp, NY on 8 Aug 1791, and it was probated 13 June 1793. It mentions his wife and 3 sons.

1790 census, Germantown, Columbia Co, NY: Gerrit D. Cook with 2 males age 16+, 2 males under 16, 2 females and 4 slaves. Clermont was on the same page, so it was nearby. Totals in Germantown: 110 white males 16+; 127 white males under 16 years, 231 white females. ML Cook note: While researching my ancestor in New York, I learned that one of his slaves was named Peter. Rev. Cock accused Peter of stealing some leather and Peter was punished with 39 lashes. No other information about Peter was given in this reference that included several court cases.

He married SARA GANSEVOORT June 12, 1762 in Albany, NY Dutch Church²⁸. She was born 1742 in Albany, NY, and died July 20, 1811 in NY, interred Hudson View Cemetery, Saratoga Co, NY²⁹.

Notes for JOHANNES "JOHN" C. TENBROECK: John C. Ten Broeck was born in July 1740. He was the only son of the marriage of Cornelis and Maria Cuyler Ten Broeck. His father was a businessman and community leader. This Johannes sometimes was known as "John C. Ten Broeck" - probably to prevent confusion with his prominent but aged uncle.

In June 1762, John C. married Albany native Sara Gansevoort at the Albany Dutch church where he was a member and regular baptism sponsor. The marriage produced eleven children. But only three of them would live to raise their own families. These Ten Broecks made their home in the third ward near the houses of their parents. His Albany property was valued on every Albany assessment roll until after 1790.

In 1763, he served as firemaster for the third ward. From 1766 to 1770 he was elected and re-elected assistant alderman. From 1771 to the outbreak of hostilities, he was chosen annually as alderman for the third ward. While on the city council, he was active in its deliberations - particularly where they involved the Albany waterfront.

During the 1760s, he had held commissions as an officer in the provincial militia - beginning a military career that matured during the next decades. In 1766, he joined in signing a constitution of the Albany Sons of Liberty. At the outbreak of hostilities in 1775, he was elected a member of the Committee of Correspondence representing the third ward. He served on the committee until mid-1777. In 1776, he was appointed to the New York Provincial Congress. Throughout the war, he maintained his militia commission.

In 1780, he was elected to his old seat on the city council. He resigned the next year to become sheriff of Albany County. Throughout the 1780s, he served in one of those offices. In 1790, his home on the east side of Market Street was configured on the census. In 1792, he was elected to represent Albany in the New York State Assembly. But before

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1800, his name had dropped from Albany rolls. John C. Ten Broeck died in December 1822 at the age of eighty-three (source: <http://www.nysm.nysed.gov/albany/bios/t/jotbroeck55.html>).

Sources: The life of John C. Ten Broeck is CAP biography number 55. This sketch is derived chiefly from family and community-based resources. On this 23rd day of July 1832 before the Justice's Court of the City of Hudson, County aforesaid, in open court, personally appeared Leonard Ten Broeck, a resident of the Town of Livingston in said County ---seventy nine years, who duly sworn according to Law makes the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress as per June 7th 1832. That he was born in Claremont in said County in 1752. That in the year 1776 he received a commission of Captain in the Militia of New York under said Col. Peter R. Livingston & Major Samuel Ten Broeck, the Brother of this applicant. That in the same year he went under said Major with his Company to Schenectady & thence on to Saratoga, where he was discharged at the expiration of one month or more. In 1777 early in the spring he was again ordered out in the same Regiment to Fort Edward & shortly afterward was discharged, but was again ordered out on the approach of Burgoyne from the north, marched to Schaghticoke Landing. Marched then to Van Schaick's Island, thence marched to Bemis Heights & was there on the day of the Battle of Stillwater but the enemy had retreated before they came up, he then crossed the River on a floating Bridge with two pieces of Brass Artillery. Marched to Schuyler's Mills where he * * * till the surrender of Burgoyne & his Company was discharged. He believes he was in actual service, during the two years, ten full months. He was again ordered out in 1778 in the Regiment of Col. Hopkins to West Point where he was encamped three months. He held the Commission through the war. In 1778 or 79 he volunteered in the Regiment of Henry Livingston, afterwards a General, & served as Capt., in said Regiment nine months. This applicant further declares that he was frequently out on smaller tours after the Tories & robbers, & believed that he served as Capt. not less than two full years in the Militia of New York as aforesaid. And he further declares that he has no documentary evidence of his services, that he relinquishes all claim to any pension except the present, & that his name is not on the roll of any State agency. /s/ Leonard Ten Broeck

And he further says that he was in actual service with most of his Company on night watch in the year 1778 in his own County as much as three months, mentioned above -

Samuel Ten Broeck being duly sworn says that he is ninety two years of age. That Leonard Ten Broeck deceased was a brother of this deponent & the husband of Gertrude Ten Broeck who has applied for a pension on account of the services of her said husband. That this deponent & said brother belonged to the Regiment of Militia commanded by Col. Peter R. Livingston. This deponent was a Major & said Leonard was a Captain in said Regiment That this deponent on account of his age & the failing of his memory can not be specific as to the exact period of the service performed by said Leonard during the Revolutionary War , but will state the same according to his best recollection. And this deponent says that he & the said Leonard served together in said Regiment at the north during the season of 1777. They were called out quite early in the season & marched first to Fort Edward & were encamped there for considerable time, & then were discharged & ----- at home but a very short time when they were called out again to stop the advance of Burgoyne who was coming from Canada. They went this time to ----- Landing & remained there a while & moved from there to Van Schaick's Island where they were encamped for some time where this deponent was taken sick & came home for a short time, but thinks that Leonard stayed with the Regiment, & on return of this deponent the troops moved to Bemis Heights & were in the Battle of Saratoga , & there remained till after the surrender of Burgoyne, & this deponent thinks & believes that said Leonard served during these two campaigns not less than six months. And this deponent further says that said Leonard performed twelve months service out of the above Regiment. The first time he thinks was for three months at West Point when he is confident Leonard served as Captain. This service he thinks was during the fall & winter of 1777 or 78, but under what officers this deponent cannot recollect.

The second was a service of nine months performed somewhere at the south, but this deponent cannot say at what point this service was performed nor under what officers, but thinks it was Col. Livingston of the Regular Army.

And he cannot say that he acted as Captain in the nine months service. All he can say is that he was a Captain in the 9 months service --- & this deponent further says that said Leonard performed much other service of which he supposes War Department have full records as this affidavit is made only in reference to the years 1777 & 78 as requested in the letter of the Hon. J. L. Edwards hereto annexed.

And this deponent further says that said Leonard was almost continually in service in this County when not on service abroad as ----- Scouts & guards, - this deponent would refer the Department to the affidavit made by him on the first application of said Leonard for a pension, & further says not. /s/ Samuel Ten Broeck

File No. ***** it appears that Leonard Ten Broeck was born in Clermont, Columbia County, New York, when on October 30, 1775, he was appointed First Lieutenant in Colonel Peter R. Livingston's Regiment of Albany County, New York Militia; on January 15, **** he was promoted to be Captain of the First Company of said Regiment, and he served at various times during the Revolution, about two years in all.

He was allowed a pension on his application executed July 23, 1832, at which time he was a resident of Livingston, New York.

He married August 18, 1776, Gertrude - - - and died November 11, 1836, aged 84 years and 1 day. She died September 8, 1838, aged 88 years, 10 months and 19 days. They were buried at Clermont, New York. In 1846 Catherine Pitcher aged 59 years and Leonard W. Ten Broeck were the only surviving children. No other ***** ** children are stated.

Office Note. No mention made of rejection of widows claim, it being so obviously unjust and such a legal quibble. The soldier's Statement of his services is not only corroborated by the Comptroller of N. Y., see reports in the claim, but it is borne out by the printed archives Edited by Fernow in 1887, Vol. I, p. 269, and his brother's (the Major) testimony. The fact that she may not have been able to prove that he served six months was absurd in view of all the evidence and does not now cut any figure at all as he was appointed in 1775, reap. In 1777 & again in 1778.

That she is the widow of Samuel J. Ten Broeck, who was a Lieutenant in the war of the Revolution & served, as I have been informed & believe, in 1775 in Captain Sharp's Minute Men as Lieutenant for 9 months. This Company was raised from the Manor of Livingston in this County. Declarant further says that in 1776 her said husband, said Samuel J. Ten Broeck was a Lieutenant in Captain Petrus Van Gaasbeck's Rangers raised in said Manor of Livingston. She has been informed that this was a 9 months tour.

She respectfully refers to the statement of John J. Best, who in his lifetime obtained a pension under the act of 7th of June 1832, & who was a soldier under my said husband, and I am informed that the widow of said John J. Best has made an application for a pension under the act of 7th July 1838, & has been allowed 9 months for the service of her husband in the said Ranger Company. She refers therefor to the papers of said John J. & Christina Best. The said Christina is well known to this declarant as was said John J. Best in his lifetime. The annexed paper dated the 23rd February 1787 in my husband's hand writing, which I found among his paper (Except the signature). My husband had performed other service in said war, but how much she cannot state, as she married him a long time after the war. & she refers to the old paper hereto annexed, and such proof as may be furnished.

Declarant further says that she was married to said Samuel J. Ten Broeck by the Rev. *** bock on the sixteenth day of April One thousand Seven Hundred & Eighty five. That she was not married to the said Samuel J. Ten Broeck previous to his last tour of service in the said war, but the marriage took place prior to the first day of June Seventeen hundred Ninety four (1794), viz. The time above stated. That she has not remarried but continued the widow of the above mentioned Samuel J. Ten Broeck, who died the 25th day of April 1830. That she has no record of marriage, & has no record of her children. That she & her husband has three children, only sons, and all were baptized by the Rev. *** ***** in Claverack. The oldest was Wessel Ten Broeck, now deceased. The second was Jeremiah Ten Broeck, & the third was William Ten Broeck, deceased.

This Declarant further says that her husband was a clerk in Drick Jansen's store at the same time that Petrus Van Gaasbeck was. That she has frequently heard her husband talk of his services in Van Gaasbeck's Company of Rangers. My father's name was Wessel Ten Broeck and was **** of the Committee of Safety of the "Camp", now Germantown in this County.

My said husband wrote his name Samuel J. Ten Broeck & was a cousin of the late Gen'l. Sam'l Ten Broeck, the late Rev. Pensioner in this County.

HON. JACOB TEN BROECK was born on the 13th of May, 1800, in Clermont, Columbia Co., N. Y., where he was reared, and remained on a farm till 1844, when he removed to the town of Greenport, whence, after a residence of ten years, he removed to the city of Hudson, and has resided here ever since. He is the only director of the Farmers' National Bank now living in Hudson who was made such upon the organization of that institution, and he has served continuously in that capacity till the present time.

In 1862 he represented the First Assembly district of the county in the State Legislature. In 1863 and 1864 he was mayor of the city of Hudson, and, on account of the war and other causes, had an unusually responsible and laborious administration. But he performed the duties of his office with ability and credit, such as have always characterized his conduct as a public man and a private citizen. He has been all his life a man of steady habits, industry, and enterprise, and by the application of these qualities to business he has secured an honorable reputation and a comfortable competence.

Mr. Ten Broeck was married, in 1821, to Miss Ann Benner, of Dutchess county, and of the eight children, the fruit of this marriage, five are living at the date of this writing. In 1854 he left the farm on which he resided, at Greenport, to one of his sons, and came to reside in the city of Hudson, retiring from active business except that required in looking after the interests of the bank. His other son resides on the old homestead in Clermont (source: Ellis, Capt. Franklin (1878). *History of Columbia County, New York*. Philadelphia: Everts & Ensign Publishers. p. 214).
